Valuable Oil Painting of Her at Columbia College.

Columbia, Mo., Nov. 14 .- Secretary George B. Ellis of the Missouri State Board of Agriculture, has received from Ernest Kellerstrass, owner the Kellerstrass Farm, R. F. D. No. 1, Kansas City, Mo., a life-size oil painting of the \$10,000 Crystal White Orpington hen, "Peggy," declared by competent poultry judges to be the most wonderful hen they have ever seen. This painting, which has been given a prominent place in Secretary Miss Alice Barber, a well-known Kansas City artist.

'Peggy" is almost as near perfection as it is possible for a bird to be, her score being 97 1/4. Mr. Keller-strass has refused \$5,000 for her, but he values her at twice that amount. She has a record of 225 eggs per year, and her eggs are readily sold at \$5 each when her owners will permit the sale of them. "Peggy" deserves and, by common consent, has been given the title of "Queen of Missouri Chickens.

Mr. Kellerstrass is the originator of the Crystal White Orpingtons and has almost 5,000 birds of this breed on his model poultry farm near Kansas City. Madame Paderewski paid Mr. Kellerstrass \$7,500 for a pen of five Crystal White Orpingtons, which were shipped to her home in Switzerland, last February.


