

It climbed up out of morning for the sun to do its little the valleys and took root in the prairie uplands of the semi-arid dis- disappearing act. tricts and responded magnificently to careful and intelligent tillage of the soil. It started eastward into the rain-belt where people shook their heads and said; "It won't do. Our soil is not right and it will not stand our rains." But all alfalfa needed was a fiar trial to demonstrate its adaptability to eastern Kansas. It crossed the Big Muddy and has been making a record in Missouri soils.

In numerous instances in northwestern Missouri the more advanced farmers have started experiments with this legume and, under years, and I don't care to wait as long fair treatment, it has not failed to deliver the goods three or four as that. times a year.

One trouble with alfalfa in Missouri, according to a practical and studious farmer, is the extreme liability to loss of the first crop through rainy weather. "This," said this farmer, "can be easily and profitably overcome. Dairying is a sadly neglected industry right where to get any? Well, why don't here, in a country that is admirably adapted to its pursuit. The silo is invaluable as an adjunct to dairying and first crop of alfalfa cannot be beaten as a silo feed for dairy cows. The quicker the green hay can be gotten into a silo after cutting the better and it does not make any difference if it is put in during a shower. 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
