THE CORN PROSPECT.
According to the government's estimates the corn crop is going to be a bumper one. The estimate, based on conditions August 1st, is for an aggregate crop of 2,940,000,000 bushels, with a fair prospect that it will reach more than 3,000,000,000, providing weather conditions are favorable throughout the remainder of the season.

FALL TREATMENT ASPARAGUS.
The most important part of asparagus culture is the fall clearing of the bed. As soon as the berries turn red the stalks should be cut off even with the ground.

PEAS IN CASES.
The peas are first reheated, after which enough of the liquor is removed to about half fill an ordinary cup. To this is added a tablespoonful of flour and two tablespoonfuls of butter, already rubbed to a paste, and when this has been added to the peas the mixture is allowed to cook slowly for a few minutes, after which it is seasoned to taste with salt and pepper.

CHOICE PEA RECIPES.
Peas with Asparagus.—Asparagus and peas is anything but an uncommon dish in the early summer when both the spring peas and the asparagus have just come to market, and set through comparatively few cooks seem to suspect this fact—the peas and asparagus that come in cans will combine just as attractively.

PEAS AND EGGS.
Peas are delicious when served as a filling for omelet, but they are also palatable when they are combined with scrambled eggs. To cook them in this way reheat the peas, seasoning to taste, and adding a tablespoonful of minced parsley in addition to the butter, pepper, and salt.

TEA TIMBALES.
These are indeed novel and extremely delicious. Cook a can of peas until they are tender; then mash them through a colander and beat the pulp to a paste. To this add two well beaten eggs, stirring continuously until they are properly scrambled. Serve on toast as quickly as possible.

PEAS ON TOAST.
To prepare peas nicely for service on toast is one of the simplest methods of cooking them. Take a can of peas and after heating them drain off a little of the liquor and season the balance with butter, pepper, and salt.
