The receipts of 2600 cattle for to day included close to 1000 head that were consigned direct to packers from other markets and this was a factor the salesmen had to contend with. Of the supplies on the market the bulk was made up of western range stock and a moderate percentage of native she stock and the cheaper grades of native steers. As with yesterday there was almost an entire absence of fat fed steers on the market. The buyers were slow to take hold of the fresh offerings but finally began to take hold at around steady to weak prices compared with the trade on opening day of the week. Outside markets were reported as opening slow and eady and this of course had its influence here. There have been no good to choice fat beeves here since the middle of last week and a few of them would no doubt meet with a of a good outlet but the rangers are going to keep coming for some time and they will be a factor in the market as long as they keep coming for they are in good ripe condition now and are making a good grade of beef. 
