The total supply at the five markets has been 148,000 against 128,000 for last week and 192,000 for the same time last year. At the local market the total for the week is 7500 and is 1100 larger than for the same time last week but 5500 less than for the same time last year. There has been a slightly better turn to the market for steers and the attractive light weights are selling some stronger than at the close of the previous week. In spots there has been some activity and strength in heavy steers but there have been but few of them here and sales Thursday were not considered as strong as earlier in the week. In a general way fat light and handy weight steers are quotable 10 to 15 cents higher than at the close of last week and the heavy kinds no more than steady. There have been no cattle here good enough to sell above \$6.25 and only one bunch at the price with one or two lots going at \$6.00 and they were right good cattle that brought the prices, although away short of top-getters. The bulk of the steers here for the week have been of short feds that sell in a range of \$5.25@5:90 and while there has been some strength noted there have been gether too many beeves of about kind here for the good of the market. The same number of steers but of a wider variety would have been for the benefit of the trade. There are a good many steers coming that are selling between \$4.50 and \$5.25 and they are of the kinds that are on western and grass order. Conditions seem to indicate that the month of December may see a good demand for a moderate supply of est-tle but it is never a month when there is a call for liberal supplies.



Grenwood's Mountain Being Probed After Fashion of Leadville District.

MINES TO BE UNDERCUT

Tremendous Depth Being Attempted on Ledges of Silver and Lead.

Spokane, Wash.; Dec. 2 .- The aud cess of the Newhouse tunnel in under cutting the mines of Clear Creek and Gilpin counties of Colorado, and in ntersecting ledge after ledge in which millions have been made accessible, and the achievement of the Yak tun-nel in its penetration of the Leadville taking of a million dollars, today are being emulated in the Greenwood country of British Columbia, where the tunnel of the Greenwood-Phoenix Tramway Company has been sent plunging into a mountain that is lin-ed with ledges of silver and lead and ed with ledges of silver and lead and that pedestals a basin of copper owned by the Granby and Phoenix companies. The reward is to be millions by proof and precedent.





POISONING BY SUGAR BEETS has investigated such losses among horses, cattle, hogs and sheep. In other years, where the winter sets in early and is severe, the beets and the Care Should Be Exercised in the Use of Fields.

fields. The tops and beets of the field thould not constitute the whole feed the animal receives. Grain and other feed should constitute a part of the ration. Horses or cattle should be turned onto the fields only a part of the time each day. Very little trouble has been aperienced this fall, for the weather has been quite warm. 
