

Chihuahua, Mexico, Dec. 23 ----One thousand troops arrived here the other night and started by railroad vesterday for San Antonio, which is ten miles from the recent battle at Mal Paso. The outfit includes a battery of light artillery and one rapid fire gun. Another thousand men are due here tonig







The court says that as the Jews spread through the land bordering on the Mediterranean they drew upon other languages for personal names, while retaining Biblical ones, and said as they sat down to the table, such new names became popular in Italy, Persia, Arabia and Turkey. 


