Six Factors in Crop Production.

According to Dr. Smith "there are six factors in crop production—soil, seed, season, science, sense and spirituality, all of which are essential and must operate in unison to insure maximum crops."

The Illinois experiment station has confined its work chiefly to the breeding of quality into corn. Professor Montgomery of the Nebraska station, however, shows that the yield of corn can be increased as much as nine bushels per are by careful selection. An increase of one bushel per aere would increase the value of the Illinois corn crop nearly \$5,000,000 annually. 


