CATTLE.

Selling Side Encounters Weaker Tone in Steer Trade.

Fat cattle trade was vold of the acmarket of the week. Receipts are running a little ahead of last week and weather conditions at present are not favorable to heavy consumption of fresh meat and this, of course, has a bearing on the market for live cattle. The estimate for the local yards this morning called for 3500, making a total of 6000 for the first two days, an horsess of 1400 eyes, the first two days, and horsess of 1400 eyes, the first two Increase of 1400 over the figures for the same days last week and a gain of 3300 as compared with the corresponding days a year ago. For two days the total at the five markets is approximately \$1,400 as compared with 78,600 for the same time last

week and 52,000 a year ago.

General marketing today included a liberal proportion of steers, quality of which ran largely on the fair to good order. Strictly choice weighty beeves were in scant supply and there was little here to satisfy eastern shipping demand, which calls for well finished 1350 to 1500 pound cattle. With increased supplies of steers there was not the vim shown in the trade that not the vim shown in the trade that was apparent yesterday. Buyers were manouvering for a lower cost schedule while sellers were opposed to any cut in values. The good yearlings and attractive light weight steers were favored in the early bidding and some of these sold about steady with the previous day. On the general run of these sold about steady with the previous day. On the general run of beef grades, however, prices ranged weak to generally a dime lower than yesterday. STOCKERS AND FEEDERS.

Conditions prevailing in the stocker and feeder trade this morning were all unfavorable for any great amount of activity being developed. The slow and weaker undertone to the corn fed cattle trade had a somewhat depressing influence on the stocker and feeder trade, the result was that prices for weighty and half fat feeders hit a lower level, around a dime covering the decline. Prices for light and medium stockers showed little change compared with yesterday, although undertone was decidedly weak. Country buyers were conspicuous by their absence; in fact the volume of outgoing trade done this week has shown a decided falling off as compared with the amount of business done at the a decided falling off as compared with the amount of business done at the corresponding time the previous week. Considering the fact that supplies were rather liberal and outlet none too broad, sellers fared fairly well, and were able to effect a final clearance before the day was over. Stock heifers were in good demand, although undertone was weak in sympathy with stocker and feeder cattles. California, Colorado and Kentucky to produce a quantity sufficient to reach the annual production of this state. "But with all this glory for Missouri as a wheat producing state, the fact still remains that more can be done towards increasing the annual wheat yield and forcing the state ahead of two or three others which rank higher by a narrow margin. There are still open for settlement and improvement many thousand acres of land, highly suitable for wheat, which can be cheaply acquired and which are con-veniently located to railroads. Nearly every county has some of those fertile stretches, varying in size from 30 and 40 acres up to 500, at present unimproved, generally used for pasturage purposes, which would produce from 20 to 30 bushels per acre. If such lands and some others of the state were turned into wheat the yield could

lands and some others of the state were turned into wheat the yield could easily be increased 10,000,000 bushels, which would be enough to give Missouri seventh rank regularly.

For 1910 the wheat yield was only 25,130,000 bushels. The crop was nearly 3,500,000 bushels short of that of 1909 when it was estimated to have nearly 3,500,000 bushels short of that of 1909, when it was estimated to have been 28,562,000 bushels. But the same falling off occurred for all of the large wheat producers west and north of here, chiefly due to the unusually late spring and unfavorable climatic conditions during the fall of 1909. 

MISSOURI WATERWAY COMMIS-SION CALLS ATTENTION TO NEED OF LEGISLATION.

STATE IS WELL ADVANCED

Has Shown Far More Progress Than Many Other States in Solving Vital Problems-Much Yet to Be Done.

That this session of the legislature will produce some highly progressive legislation on the subject of water in its various aspects is the opinion of many of the legislators of both parties

The report of the Missouri Water-

report of that commission shows a careful and thorough study of the conditions in the state, and that the state is itself far in advance of others in the intelligent handling of these prob-

It is thought that the life of the commission will be indefinitely extended under an increased appropriation in order that these subjects may be more fully investigated, and the facts found made the basis of intelli-

The subjects to be investigated are: The community water supply and its relation to the public health; the disposal of sewage so as to prevent contamination of water supply; the maintenance of the ground water level and the flow of streams and springs through improved agriculture and forestry, and the prevention of floods and bank erosion; the navigation of the waters; the conditions and benefits of drainage and levees and levee building; and the development of the water power resources of the state.

Each of these subjects is of vital importance and intimately concerns a vast number of people in the state, so that it is thought that investigation on these lines will be welcomed, and it is certain that legislators will endear themselves to their constituents by the continuance of this work.

The general water law will probably provide for state supervision in the matter of disposal of power sites and water supply privileges, and encourage the drainage and levee work, and the much needed reforestation, with the view of preventing floods and the washing of the fertile surface soil of the farms.

CASH VALUE OF LOST SOIL IS

OVER \$800,000. Missouri Waterway Commission Discovers That Missouri River Alone

Steals 8,000 Acres. According to figures presented by the Missouri Waterway Commission in its report to the legislature more than 8,000 acres of the state's area is each year lopped off by the rivers of the state, and as an asset is for-

ever lost.

The conclusion of the Commission is arrived at by caculations from official figures of what the tons of mud and silt of the rivers equal in acres. The United States government figures for the weight of sand, mud and silt, in solution and suspension, in the Missouri river alone are 435,600,000 tons annually (which, by the way, is from twenty to thirty times the annual production from all the farms, mines, quarries, sand banks and clap pits of the state). The average depth of the cutting of the Misouri river is about twenty-five feet, as it cuts both above and below the ordinary water level. An acre of land 25 feet thick weighs (estimated at 100 pounds to the cubic foot) 54,450 tons, hence the average loss to the state each year is 8,000 acres, or from 15 to 25

acres per mile of the Missouri's

length in the state. Allowances are made by the Commission for the sand and soil in the rivers, which come from surface wash, and are therefore not among the acres really destroyed by falling into the rivers. However, this soil is really more valuable than that which sloughs off into the rivers, for the larger part of the land which the rivers gnaw away is not under cultivation; but almost all of the soil washed down from the higher lands is the covering of farms under cultivation. The virgin soil does not wash off. The commission, therefore, takes the position that all the soil in the rivers is a loss to the state, either as land actually destroyed or good land ruined by water scraping. Eight thousand acres are equal to 100 80acre farms, which, at a value of \$100 per acre, equal \$800,000, and the commission figures this as an annual drain upon the resources of the state. The legislature will be asked to continue the investigation in this field means of preventing this loss.



He was of the commonest people, and was glad of it. It was one of the secrets of his power. "Rich people's children," he once remarked, "seldom turn out well. They are complacent, arrogant and concepted, and think they need to learn nothing because they have enough to live on apyway. On the contrary, poor men's sope must labor to lift them-with their wiedom.

Luther's family was not the lowest class. For generations his ancestors had owned their house and farm in the village of Mohra, on the western side of the Thuringian hills. There are etill Luthers in the same tiny hamlet, changed perhaps as little as the place Itself,-Prof. Arthur C. McGiffert in the Century.

GRACE AT CLIFFORD'S INN

Quaint Custom at Dinner Which Recalled Days When All Lawyers Were Connected With Church.

The purchase of Clifford's Inp as Bechelor recalls the quaint form of grace. After dinner, when the table cloths had been removed and before world. wine and dessert had been placed on the tables, a loaf made in the form of a cross of four small arms was handed to the senior member of the Kentish Mess who presided at the table. He then with a small hammer knocked once on the table, and every one, including the principal and the rules, then stood up. Then with his right hand he raised the loaf up above bis head to the full extent of his arm and brought it down with a thump on the table. This he did three times. and then slid it down the full length of the table to the vice-president, who arrested it in its career and handed it to a servant in attendance.

This ceremony was symboli 1 and of origin dating from the day when all lawyers were either actually ecelectastics or at least connected in some way with the church. The knock was merely to attract attention and had no symbolic meaning. But the bread made in the form of a leaf with four small arms symbolized the bread of life centered on the four evengelists. 
