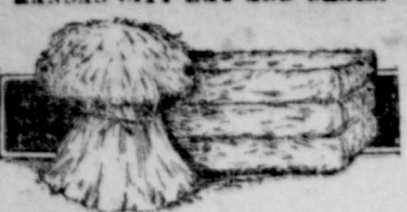

A COMING CROP. Peanut Assumes Large Proportions in Louisiana and Mississippi.

HAS PROVED PROFITABLE. Cotton Mills Install Machinery to Crush Nuts for Oil.

St. Louis, March 2.—The South is apparently going to have a new money crop. In sections which have been ravaged by the boll weevil the farmers have been induced to try peanuts, and the experiments last year were so successful that the movement has spread rapidly. In Mississippi preparations are being made to handle the crop on a large scale, says the Globe-Democrat.

At a recent conference of oil-mill managers held in Jackson, it was estimated that the average Mississippi peanut in 1911 might reach 150,000 acres. They are displacing cotton in boll weevil districts. During 1910 several mills in the state formerly engaged in crushing cotton seed, installed machinery for crushing peanuts. They paid the farmers \$1 per bushel for the nuts, delivered at the mill. The crushing of peanuts for oil by cotton seed mills is something of an experiment, but in view of the fact that the United States annually imports large quantities of peanut oil and some peanut cake from Germany, it would seem that the infant industry is one of promise.

At the conference between Draper and his wife he suggested that in the future he and the one hired man would do the field work and care for the garden, while she, in addition to doing the housework, should perform the duties formerly assumed by herself and her house servant. Mrs. Draper protested, contending that if the hired girl was to be dispensed with, she should be relieved of all the outdoor work and look after nothing but the house.
