prices were not quotably changed one way or the other as a result of what little business was transacted. There is a strong likelihood of an increase in cattle marketing next week in consequence of the higher turn in prices during the current week.

For the greater part of the week fat steer trade was in decidedly good shape. Receipts were curtailed in response to warnings sent out late last week and substantial price gains were registered during first half of the week. In Wednesday's session prices on the bulk of beef cattle were fully a quarter higher than at the close of last week and some of the light butch. The bulk yesterday sold at \$6.80@7.10. Shipping demand was a factor in putting the market on a better footing. Demand from this source was broad and at the same time there was a good inquiry from local packers. a good inquiry from local packers. Trade was active at the advancing prices during the first three days and early clearances were the rule. Trade started out Thursday with the same vim noted on preceding days but weakened toward the close and some lots sold a dime under best levels of the preceding day. Aside from this slight weakness course of the market has been favorable to the selling and producing interests. At the close producing interests. Many feeders lost heavily during this remarkable slump in the prices of fat cattle and hogs, and in consequence did not care to assume the risk of feeding the next year on corn worth 50 to 55 cents a bushel. The high prices of 1909 and 1910 were in the main governed by the law of supply and demand. Those who


