BIG REALTY MONTH. Shows Lively Demand For Farm Lands in Texas.

San Antonio, Tex., March 6.—Real estate transfers during the month of February in this city and Bexar county aggregated \$1,966,553, the number of instruments filed for record being 821. Building operations have kept pace with the activity of real estate and the value of permits issued approximate one-third of a million dollars, this, however, within the limits of the city. If the improvements of the entire country begun during the month just closed were considered, the actual amount would be more than \$1,000,000. For the past four years a little more than \$3,000,000 amount of this year indicate that 1911 will be the record breaker in the industry this is devoted to substantial homes. If to this be added the vast sum which is being expended in bridge building, land improvements and irrigation, some notion of the substantial improvement era now on in Bexar county may be approximated.

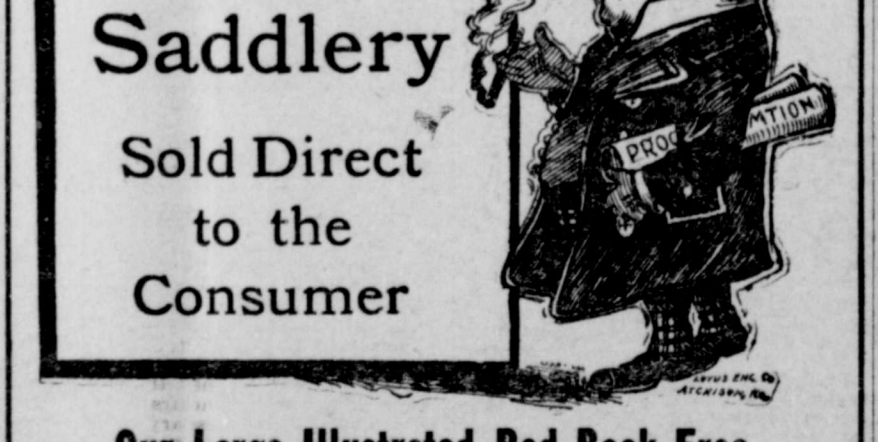

GIRL FACES PERIL

Americans Should Avoid Paris Unless Prepared.

Steady Income Needed for Young Woman's Study of Art or Music in French Capital, Says Mrs. Ada Leigh Lewis.

New York.—A young girl should be possessed of health, good education, strong moral sense and an assured income of at least \$50 a month if she wishes to study in Paris.

Mrs. Lewis is in America to obtain a fund for the rebuilding and enlargement of two of her homes. In her philanthropic work she comes in contact with thousands of young American girls who pour into the French capital every year.

"No girl should come to Paris to study without a definite financial income on which she can absolutely depend," she said. "A girl should set aside at least \$20 a month for the demands of training; she cannot get on with less. Nor can she possibly live for less than \$20 a month, \$5 a week."

"But even more subtle is the peril within herself. One never knows what loneliness really is until one is a stranger in a strange city.

BREED ARMY HORSES

Great Britain on Still Hunt for Good Animals.

Sum of \$250,000 to Be Set Aside for Developing Equine—Choice Ones to Go Abroad Because Foreigners Pay More.

London.—A sort of government stud, of which the purpose is to establish a new breed of horse, is not unlikely to be presently endowed by the commissioners of the development grant.

This being so, it is proposed as a first step to try to convert the hunter from a mongrel to an aristocrat. The hunter is the horse of horses for utility. The cavalry and the territorials want nothing but the hunter. At present the breeding of hunters is a random business, as it always is in cross-bred stocks.

It is argued that a really scientific and practical body, with the grant of several thousand dollars a year, could evolve a pure bred hunter of just the sort required, just as the pigeon or dog fanciers have evolved birds and dogs of every sort of "pattern."

A letter from Mr. Haldane was read at a meeting of the City of London Territorial Force association, in which the secretary of state for war wrote that progress was being made with the scheme for the supply of horses on mobilization, and before long definite instructions would be issued.
