CATTLE.
Receipts on Increase, Steer Trade
Has Slow Tone.

A fairly good run of cattle registered at the local yards today, receipts being estimated at 3000 head, 1000 more than arrived last Tuesday but slightly less than the number on sale the corresponding day a year ago. The five markets had 29,500 cattle, according to first reports, 7000 more than last Tuesday and almost double the supply in sight at the five points a year ago. The run was again made up of a big proportion of fat steers. Around the local yards were embodied in the day's offerings.

The market started out much the same as on the previous day. Chicago opened weak and reports from outside river markets, all well supplied with cattle, were not of a character to inspire confidence in the trade locally. Buyers with plenty of material available were in no hurry to begin operations and it was quite late in the forenoon when sales began down to a business basis and the offerings started moving toward the scales.

When sellers began cutting loose from their holdings it was at prices generally around a dime lower, although there were instances where some attractive yearlings and handy weight escaped with little if any weakness. Top was \$6.30 for 1420-pound offerings. Bulk of the good useful steers went in a range of \$5.85 to \$6.50, the fair to good grades dropping in at \$5.65 to \$5.90 and common light sellers ranging down around the 50 mark.

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COLD STORAGE LEGISLATION.

National Provisioner: Legislatures in various states go on grinding out measures for the alleged "regulation" of the cold storage industry. Some few have reached the point of becoming laws; the majority are still in the formative stage. Fortunately the legislative season is drawing to a close, and the trade and the consumer will be spared the infliction of fool legislation for another year.

"Fool" legislation is all most of these cold storage measures can be called—foolish from the standpoint of any who may honestly believe in them, as well as from the standpoint of the trade. Whether they assume to set a time limit for storage, or whether they impose labeling provisions, they are in most instances equally impractical and unenforceable. A short time limit is ridiculous and will defeat the alleged aim of reducing food prices, and a long time limit is foolish because it is unnecessary. Labeling regulations will have to be framed after a more sensible pattern than those thus far offered if they are to be made effective.

The trouble is that faddists and demagogues are the authors of most of these measures, and most of them will not "hold water," either in practice or in the courts. The cheap politician has been using cold storage as a handle for lifting himself into public notice. When he finds the public losing interest in the subject he will be the first to drop it.

The cold storage industry does not object to reasonable and sensible regulation; indeed, it would be the beneficiary. But such regulation does not come from demagogue or sensational newspaper agitation. It requires intelligence rather than prejudice to frame such legislation.

HOGS AT SIX DOLLAR MARK.

Hogs sold at \$6 per hundred weight at the local stock yards yesterday. This shows a sensational decline during the past couple of months, and puts the prices of live pork practically \$5 per hundred pounds lower than at the high time in March last year. This is a decline of nearly one-half in prices for the live product in a little more than one year. Not only this, it puts the prices now being received by the farmers for their most prolific live product of feed lots at a lower price than has prevailed for a period of more than two years.

This drop of nearly one-half in prices during the past year naturally suggests that the consumer should be getting a benefit. The most common conclusion with the man who goes to the butcher market every day for his meats is that, as the live hogs have dropped off nearly one-half in prices, the price asked by the market man for the different cuts of pork, whether fresh or cured, should show a corresponding drop. There has been some drop in the retail prices but there is yet a conviction with the consumer that he is still paying too much for his cuts of pork. There is considerable difference of opinion as to whether it is the fault of the packer or the retail man that prices to the consumer are not correspondingly as much lower as are the live hogs.

Why have hogs shown this long drop? It is nothing more or less than a working out of the natural laws of supply and demand. Four years ago there was a small panic. It started all farmers to unloading hogs as fast as they could get to market. Corn was high and the price of hogs cheap. This stimulated a rush to sell and there was little thought taken of the future of the market or any recovery from the panicky condition. Everything with a squeal was sacrificed and six months after the start of the panic the country was face to face

with a shortage in the supply of hogs. Even the breeding stock was sacrificed and for two years there was a era of shortage and a gradual advance in prices until a little more than one year ago five hogs sold at the highest prices known since the establishment of modern packing houses. This started the country to taking some thought of replenishing its breeding stock. The farmer is naturally on the bull side of the market, and, while he was always talking that there were few hogs in the country, he and his neighbor were industriously holding back a few breeding sows and before the country and the market were aware of it there was a large increase in the supply of hogs in the country. So much so that during the three expired months of the current year there has been an increase of nearly a million hogs arrived at the six leading market centers.

The result has been natural—lower prices, a decline of nearly one-half in the prices compared with the high time last year. Corn is cheaper than it has been for some time and there is every evidence that the coming fall will see one of the largest crops of hogs that has been marketed in this country for the past several years. Hog signs may fall but there is nothing in sight at present that does not point to still lower prices for hogs.

Olive Sandwiches—Use thin slices of white bread, buttered, cut in heart shape. Between each two slices place a layer of Neufchâtel cheese mixed to a paste with equal quantities of cream and salad dressing and cover with chopped olives.

Gentlemen—While I have retired from the piano business, after over thirty-five years devoted to it, yet I am more or less interested in what is going on locally. I noticed an advertisement in yesterday's paper by one of your local competitors, which was very misleading as to its meaning to the public.

In looking over the names quoted in the list which it is inferred you sold, I am inclined to think that a part of this list was made up from one of my old journals which dated back from fifteen to twenty-five years.
