ALASKA COAL HEARING.

Secretary Fisher Orders Notorious Cunningham Cases Taken Up. Seattle, Wash., May 5.—An early termination of the vexed Alaskan coal land question, which in its seriousness almost threatens a revolt against American administration of affairs in the far north, especially at Cordova, may be brought about through the determination of Secretary of the Interior Fisher, as announced in dispatches from Washington to have the famous Cunningham cases brought to a hearing next Monday in the national capital before Commissioner Bennett of the general land office.

Farmer Should Greatly Reduce Cost of Own Table.
