This appreciation applies to practically everything selling above the \$6.00 line. Between \$5.75 and \$6.00 there has not been much variance in values during the week. The abundance of cheap and medium priced short fed and grassy cattle had a depressing effect on the 10@20c lower than a week ago, generally. Unevenness has characterized the trade in the lower grades and losses of greater and less extent than that quoted were noted in extremes.

Choice Missouri beeves registered a top of \$6.50 this week, the highest spot hit since early in April except on a few odd head. There was quite a showing of sales around \$6,25@6.35, while \$6.00@6.20 bought a real decent class of cattle. Kansas cattle, fed on the grass sold up to \$6.05, but not many of the offerings from Kansas pastures were good enough to get above \$5.75, and \$5.25@5.70 caught many of them with the half-fat com mon kinds ranging on down below the \$5.00 line. COWS. BULIS AND MIXED.

In general aspects the market for cows, helfers and mixed yearlings has followed along in the course of beef steers. The season for corn fed butcher stock is well advanced. Only an occasional load of dry lot helfers and yearling cattle is showing up now and practically no good corn fed cows are coming. For the few dry fed helfers and yearlings offered during the week the demand ruled strong and prices have been on a good, firm level compared with a weok ago. Sales of good dry lot cows were so scarce of hardly furnish comparisons from

day to day. Strictly good grass cow, and heifers have also held up well Medium and low grade grassers, how ever, have been plentiful and these have been working toward a cheape level. Packers have bought a good many thin fleshed helfers and young cows that the country was taking recently at considerably cheaper prices than were in force ten days ago. Bulk of the cows coming now are selling at \$3.25@4.00, with a good many canners going at \$2.25@2.75. As high as \$6.30 was paid for choice mixed yearling heifers and steers which in-dicates the strength of demand for good "baby beef."

TRIMMING TOMATO PLANTS.

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

ASIATICS ON BRITISH SHIPS

Growing Preference for Chinese Seamen Over Britone for Service Under Red Ensign.

One of the principal grievances complained of by the union, we believe, is the alleged growing preference of ship owners for Asiatic seamen, particularly Chinese seamen, to British seamen, for service under the red ensign. The recent declaration by Winston Churchill, home secretary, is to the following pertinent effect: With regard to the alleged dumping of Chinese labor on British ships, the figures show that the number of British seamen employed in the British mercantile marine is steadily increasing. while the number of Lascars and Asintics of all kinds was stationary. In 1905 there were 263,686 persons employed, of whom 180,482 were British and 48,483 were Lascars and Asiatics. In 1908 there were 198,474 British and 48,960 Lascars and Asiatics, an increase of nearly 18,000 British seamen in four years. It should be remembered that a very large proportion of Lascars and Asiatics employed were natives of India and British subjects.-Shanghai Times.

Outlook at Present Is For Biggest Yield on Record.

Washington, July 7 .- Official estimates of the cotton crop report of 1911 indicates that it will be the lar-gest in the history of the country, approximately, according to the proper figures, 14,425,000 bales of 500 pound each, exceeding by almost 1,000,000 bales the record crop of 1904.

The condition of the cotton crop on June 25, was 88.2 per cent of normal, compared with 87.8 per cent on May 25, 1911; 80.7 per cent on June 25, 1910; 74.6 per cent in 1909, and 80 per cent, the average condition on June 25, during the past ten years. Doctor A. N. Murray, acting chief

of the crop reporting board of the department of agriculture, has made the following statement, subsequent to the issuance of the cotton crop re The report shows the condition o

the crop to be higher than any corresponding date in the last ten years. A month ago the general condition was 8.5 per cent above the ten-year average. Today it is 10.3 per cent
