English "Pest" Found to Be in Reality a Blessing to Farmers.

Sait Lake City, Utah., Oct. 13.— Utah farmers no longer will look upon the English sparrow as one of their enemies, recent government investigations having demonstrated that the sparrow, as well as numerous other Utah birds, is a powerful aid in the fight being wased against the alfalfa weevil.

This information is conveyed to F. W. Chambers, state fish and game commissioner, in a letter from E. R. Klamoach of the Bureau of Riological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture, who spent two months in Utah recently investigating the relation of the Utah birds to the weevil pest.




