Crier for justice

Common Pleas Judge Patrick McFalls said Ben Woods accepted the position, which pays \$32,577.

Woods, 59, was forced to quit as city council president in 1989 after being convicted of racketeering, income-tax evasion, extortion and conspiracy.

Hunters raise jobless rate

Wisconsin had the largest increase nationwide in unemployment claims during the Thanksgiving week, according to the federal government.

But the increase may have more to do with the hunting season than the misfiring economy. Companies often close their doors, adorning them with "Gone Hunting" signs, which allows full-time employees to file for unemployment benefits.

The U.S. Department of Labor reported Wisconsin's filings for new benefits rose by 20,564 the week ending Nov. 24, to 35,155 initial claims.

Cheese plant being discussed for Muleshoe

Representatives of Caprock Securities in Lubbock were in Muleshoe on Monday to begin researching the possibility of a cheese plant in Muleshoe.

City Manager David Brunson and his assistant for economic development, Janet Claborn, attended the regular meeting of the Bailey County

Commissioners' Court, where the idea was discussed.

The Lubbock men, J.L. Hutcheson and Joe Pate, said now is the viability," rural economic development legislation recently passed in Texas spurred their interest in such a project, and they read in the Lubbock paper that Muleshoe was interested in securing a cheese plant.

"This is just in the embryonic stage," Pate said.

"What we want to determine Hutcheson said.

If the project proceeds under the new legislation, an agricultural improvement district would be formed. Hutcheson said the law allows such a district to have taxing powers, but

he does not envision that being part of the cheese-plant project.

"If it won't pay its own way, then we wouldn't want to build it," he said.

Unrelated to Caprock's interest, Claborn said Albin Smith of Clovis had expressed interest in a Muleshoe cheese plant

Lady Mules win New Deal tournament

NEW DEAL — The Lady Mules converted green to gold last weekend by winning first place in the 11-team New Deal Mean Green Classic.

The Lady Mules defeated Anton 81-41 in the opening round, downed New Deal 59-37, and then outlasted the Smyer Lady Cats 60-54 in the finals.

Touch fouls hurt the Lady Mules in the first half of the Anton game, but Muleshoe still owned a 41-24 lead at halftime. Tough defense held the Lady Bulldogs to three free throws in the first six minutes of the second half, while Muleshoe pounded the ball inside.

Shani Rasco and Mindy Locker put eight unanswered points on the boards for the Lady Mules during that time.


Anne Cox and Sara Benham made a connection at the end of the third period that pushed the Muleshoe advantage to 55-31. That Cox-to-Benham connection paid big dividends in the final frame.

After Cox fed Benham on the blocks on successive trips down the floor and Benham scored on turn-around jump shots, the Lady Bulldogs fronted Benham. Cox lobbed the ball over the defense and Benham laid the ball on the glass.

Britni Gratin quietly scored 17 points, Benham made 15 and Cox had 13 for Muleshoe. Rendi Hodge nailed four threepointers for 12 points, Candace Hutto scooped up eight points, Locker six, Kayla Glover had four, Tiffany Flores three, Rasco two and Tori Barton made one.

The Lady Mules scored 33 points off turnovers, pulled down 44 rebounds with Cox and Benham grabbing seven each and scored 53 points off the bench.

Muleshoe did not treat the host Lady Lions much better. Jessica Carpenter found the range from three-point land, connecting four times to lead the Lady Mules with 14 points; Gartin added 13. Locker had seven points, Cox, Flores, Rasco and Benham had four each, Hodge, Barton

and Hutto three apiece.

The Lady Mules trimmed the claws of Smyer's Lady Cats in the finals of the tournament, but Smyer post Codye Pitman could prove to be one of the best inside players the Lady Mules will face all year.

"Today was a test for us," Lady Mule coach Shana Simms said. "I did not do a good job with our post defense today, and Smyer has a very good post player and some very good outside shooters. Gartin carried the load for us today. Rasco played well inside and that opened the outside game for Gartin."

Muleshoe and Smyer traded buckets in the first period and were tied at 15-15 after

the first eight minutes. Gartin had two threes in the second period and Barton sank a three as the final seconds ticked off to give the Lady Mules a 28-25 advantage at intermission.

Carpenter nailed a three with 2:40 left in the third period to give Muleshoe its largest lead of the day, 40-32. Lack of depth hurt the Lady Cats as Muleshoe rotated players in the game and kept fresh legs on the floor.

At the quarter break, the Lady Cats seemed get their second wind and battled Muleshoe in the final eight minutes —



GED scheduled at high school

The General Educational Development Test is scheduled to be given at Muleshoe High School starting at 8 a.m. Dec. 15 and (if needed) Dec. 17. Candidates must begin the test on Dec. 15.

The fee is \$40 and must be paid at the time of registration and a photo ID is required at the time of testing.

Individuals testing for a certificate of high school equivalency must complete all five of the GED tests, and those holding partial scores must complete the battery of tests before a new test goes into use Jan. 1 or their scores will be invalidated.

Applicants must be Texas residents, officially withdrawn from school and not a graduate of any accredited U.S. high school. Seventeen-year-olds also are required to have the eligibility verfication/ parental approval form signed by a parent or guardian; anyone in this group should contact the high school before the testing date.






Chisum announces for House speaker







Ready, get set: Seed-starting time is just weeks away

Most people will continue to buy their tomato and pepper and bedding plants from garden centers, and understandably so - starting your own is a lot more hassle.

As I say every year, though, the garden centers can't carry everything. For those who want a specify type of tomato or flower, starting them at home may be the only way to get them.

The biggest boost to this aspect of gardening has come in recent years with the re-discovery of old types of tomatoes with flavor and color that make most supermarket tomatoes seem nasty in comparison.

You may think this is early, but count the weeks: Tender vegetables that go outside around the first of May can go out at least a month earlier with the right protection, meaning about the end of March. Many of them take 60 days to reach optimum transplant size, so count back 60 days and you're talking about starting them indoors at the end of January - six weeks from now.

If you don't already have the seeds, you'll probably have to get them by mail-



order, which will take a couple of weeks. Voilá! Once the Christmas tree is out of the way, it's time to pull out the seed flats whether it's the efficient commercial kind or milkcarton bottoms or cardboard boxes or whatever!

Tomatoes and peppers certainly are among the easiest plants to start from seeds. In fact, though, most people don't have any trouble getting the seeds to sprout; they lose the seedlings between sprouting time and transplanting time.

Common causes of loss

• Damping off — This is a disease that comes from soilborne bacteria, causing tender seedlings to wither just when they appear to be doing well. As I say every year, it's worth buying a commercial mix in which to sprout the seeds (or heat your dirt in an oven for 20 minutes or so to kill the bacteria).

problem may not be apparent right away, but over a period of time the plants become so distended and delicate that their survival is unlikely. A 4-foot fluorescent shop light (costing about \$5) will provide enough lighted space to start several plants. Sunny windows will work - just remember to turn the plants daily so they don't grow in one direction too much.

 Lack of nourishment — If you use a sprouting medium that contains compost or soil, you won't need to worry about feeding until you pot the seedlings. Otherwise, start using half-strength fish emulsion when the first true leaves

• Dry air — The average house is not a healthy environment. Once the seedlings are in individual pots (some people plant them that way to start with), try setting the pots on a tray of pebbles and water.

As usual, many more details about seed-starting will be coming up!

Last call to get those bulbs planted. Most species probably could still bloom in the spring, although the flow-• Not enough light — This ers might not be as lush as

they would be had the bulbs been planted earlier.

Snow crocus probably wouldn't bloom this winter, since they'll be coming up in another month. New ones planted now probably wouldn't have time to develop a full-size root system before then.

Whatever you have left, though, I'd go ahead and plant them, rather than let them go to waste.

This might also be taken as last call to spread compost or manure on your garden for next spring. I say "might" because the experts probably would say it should have been done a month or more ago, but I do mine whenever I get the chance.

Most people also say it should be dug into the top time readers of this column know I'm not a big believer in much digging or disturbing the top layers of soil. Usually, I just spread these things on the ground which means sometimes I use un-composted manure and don't have to worry about it "burning" the plants. By the time the stuff penetrates to the root zone, it's had time to break down

If you still believe in a lot of digging, I won't make fun of you — but if I had to do anything that time-consuming in order to grow things, I wouldn't have a chance. I don't get that kind of free time.



Colunga and Heathington knocked down a threepointer each to ignite the Mules to a 20-7 quarter and allow them to take a 27-20 lead to the locker room.


Overall, the Hornets outscored the Mules 37-36 from the floor, but the difference in the game came from the charity stripe.

HOUSTON — "Home alone" is not just a kid's fear. For millions of older Americans, the idea of spending the holidays by themselves can bring on depression and dread over what should be a season to celebrate.

"One of the joys of growing older is the ability to be alone and at peace with oneself," said Dr. Robert Luchi of the Huffington Center on Aging at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "One of the sad things about aging is being alone when you do not wish to be."

Television can contribute, especially for people who watch a lot of depressing news about war, terrorism and other daily events.

What is accepted reality about living alone during the rest of the year can become an exaggerated source for depression during the holidays.

"It can be depressing at times to be alone, but during the holidays when television is full of cheery, Norman Rockwellesqueportrayals of the perfect family get-together, it can make even secure, confident people dread this time of year," Luchi said.

There are some things

you can do, however, to take charge of the situation and not fall prey to the "holiday blues." Consider the following:

• Help someone else. What better way to get in the holiday spirit and away from an empty house than to help another human being? Volunteer at a local charity organization, visit a nursing home or take some baked goods to neighbors who might not have your mobility and independence.

• If you are not able to get out as easily, ask what you can do from home. Many organizations would welcome the chance for any help, even if it means doing work from your home.

Conner found Guzmán open in the lane for the Mules' final score as Littlefield missed several scoring opportunities and nailed a three at the buzzer.


Guzmán had 10 points to lead the Mule scoring. Washington had eight, Barker six, Robertson three and Connor and Rodríguez two each.




