## SLOW DEAL IN STEERS

EFERINGS MOSTLY PLAIN AND DEMAND FOR THIS CLASS RATHER SLUGGISH.

### PRICES STEADY TO EASY

Butcher Market Slow With Weaker Tone Prevailing-Bulls and Calves Unchanged-Stock Cattle Firm.

There was no improvement in the general tone of the beef cattle mar-ket today. Receipts were moderate at this point and supplies elsewhere were not excessive but conditions and the total at the five markets was 15,000. For the expired part of the week local receipts show a gain of 2,000 head over the same period of last week, while total marketing at the five points indicates an increase of 12,000 head, approximately, for the

same period.

All markets report a plethora of medium and low grade cattle this week, and a scarcity of well-finished week, and a scarcity of well-finished kinds, and prices for the less desirable classes have been under bearish pressure. Chicago has had a sharp break in all but the choice to prime grades of steers and conditions there have been reflected in the market at Missouri river points. The local supply of steers today was made up largely of medium and plain short-fed natives, and western rangers. Nothing of strictly choice or prime quality was on display. With none of the buyers very anxious to take on medium and very anxious to take on medium and plain steers the movement was rather on the sluggish order with prices on the general run of offerings not bet-ter than steady to weak, as compared with the previous day.

Movement of Stock and Feeding Cattle for 1911 Shows Gain.

is that cattle feeding in sections contigeous to this point during the comping winter and spring will be the smallest for several seasons. ### SURVEY OF KANSAS SOILS

Examination of Semi-Arid Region Is Made By Government Experts.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 9. port of the Reconnoissance Soil Survey of the Western Part of Kansas has just been made to Secretary Wilson. 

One of the chief officials who daily handles the tubes containing the rare element noticed that a diamond in his ring seemed to change color and increase in brilliancy. Since then several experiments have been made. A variety of precious stones have been enclosed in a box with two tubes, each containing 50 milligrams of radium. Every stone changed color after exposure of different duration. Some magnificent tints have been obtained, including a delicate pink in one diamond.

For Cheaper Food.

The Rhode Island conservation commission reports that there are 400 unutilized farms and large areas which have never been cultivated at all, although they are very close to the market. Yet Rhode Island is celebrated as the most "thickly settled" state in the union. The possibilities of this country in the production of food have not begun to be exhausted; the limitations are nowhere in sight, observes the Springfield Republican. All that we need to make cheaper food is more people willing to till the land.

10,000 Boys Off London Streets.

A new set of by-laws regulating street trading by juveniles has been approved by the London county council educational committee. If the bylaws are sanctioned by the council no boy under fourteen and no girl under sixteen will be permitted to engage in street trading. It was stated that the effect of the new regulations would be to take 10,000 boys and 1,000 girls off the streets, where they
