GOOD FARMING PAYS. SHEEP TRADE NOMINAL

Corn Given Proper Cultivation Making Big Yields Around Gower, Mo.

C. E. Kincade, a progressive young farmer of near Gower, Mo., is congratulating himself on the result of his corn crop this year, which is the targest he has ever raised. Mr. Kincaid has harvested part of his corn crop and was agreeably surprised to find it running slightly better than 56 bushels to the acre. "That is doing pretty well in my opinion, especially considering the hot, dry weather last summer that we had to contend with," said Mr. Kincaid, who was at the yards yesterday with a load of hogs. "For a time late in June and early in July it did not look like corn would make hardly anything, but it is turn-

D. H. Breitweiser, a prominent farmer and shipper of "Ipland, Neb., who was at the yards esterday, says that in his section of the country there are few cattle on feed. "There are no large bunches of cattle on feed such as are usually to be found in my territory at this season of the year." said Mr. Breitweiser to a representa-tive of The Journal. "What few cat-tle that are now on feed are in small, scattered lots and, owing to the high price of corn and the scarcity of hay, the bulk of these will be shipped between now and Christmas. Unless there is a decided change in day and comparisons. Unless there is a decided change in sentiment among the feeders and in general conditions there will be a very scant run of cattle after the first of the year. The main factor in reducing feeding operations in my part of Nebraska is the scarcity of roughness. The hay crop was very light this year and without hay feeders are handicapped in handling cattle.
