However, feeders are marketing their hogs as soon as possible. It is rare that hogs are made to weigh over 200 ibs. before marketing. This can be traced directly to the shortage of feed. 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

It was afterward shipped to Hamburg, Germany, where it will be acidized and rendered ready for use in commerce and the arts.
