No fireworks this year!

Bailey County and municipal officials had one word Monday for anyone intending to set off fireworks during the upcoming holiday season... don't:

- Don't buy them
- Don't sell them
- Don't possess them
- Don't use them

On Thursday, June 9, County Judge Sherri Harrison issued a 60 hour disaster declaration banning the purchase, selling, possession or use of any fireworks in Bailey County, and the next day Texas Gov. Rick

Perry extended that declaration, placing the county under the state's emergency management plan and making it illegal to celebrate Independence Day with the traditional pyrotechnics.

But it gets even worse... although the judge's original prohibition didn't allow for the annual fireworks display by the Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department, Judge Harrison amended that first order Friday, to allow the city's fireworks display under the supervision of fire department officials.

Her actions were ratified by the Bailey County Commissioners' Court Monday.

However, Muleshoe City Manager David Brunson announced during Monday's meeting of the Muleshoe City Council that unless the area received a significant amount of rainfall prior to July 4, there wouldn't be a fireworks display.

The city manager said that while most portions of the county's burn ban doesn't affect the areas within the Muleshoe city

limits, the fireworks prohibition of the governor's disaster declaration does.

On Tuesday, the city manager announced that the city has cancelled its fireworks order.

It was also pointed out Monday that a violation of the county burn ban, which was a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$500, is much more severe while under the state's emergency management plan. Violators can now receive up to a \$1,000 fine and up to six months in county jail, and according to Muleshoe Police Chief Brian Frieda this isn't a "ticketable" offense. In other words, violators

Muleshoe driver, truck involved in accident

A three-vehicle collision on Hwy. 70 west of Plainview sent seven people to area hospitals and closed down traffic for close to six hours Friday, June 10, just after noon.

According to Department of Public Safety Trooper Jarod Browne, a westbound 2004 Ford F-150 pickup driven by Donna Waugh, 54, of Plainview, an employee at Unger Library who lives in front of where the accident occurred two miles west of I-27, had stopped to make a left turn apparently to retrieve her mail when her pickup was rear-ended by a 1996 Mercury minivan driven by 34-year-old Alejandro Bravo of Olton.

Upon impact, the minivan spun across the highway into the path of an eastbound 2007 Freightliner tanker truck driven by Donald Jones, 50, of Muleshoe. Witnesses said the van

and the semi-truck hit virtually head on.

Browne said Jones "tried to take evasive action" by veering off the highway, but the impact was "almost instantaneous."

Bravo was airlifted from the scene to University Medical Center in Lubbock.

Waugh, Jones and four occupants in Bravo's minivan — his wife and three children, ages 1, 3 and 4 — were taken by ambulances to Covenant Hospital Plainview.

Three ambulances were used to transport the victims, Browne said, with one returning to make a second transport.

All were treated and released at Covenant except for Jones, who was airlifted to UMC. Jones later was released while Bravo was listed in stable condition on Saturday afternoon.

The truck, which Browne said was carrying approximately 44,000 gallons of liquid carbon dioxide, overturned with

the cab landing in the westbound ditch and the tank resting diagonally in the highway on its side, blocking both lanes.

As officials with the trucking company, Reliant Transport of Muleshoe, worked to remove the semi, Browne said both eastbound and westbound traffic was diverted until about 6 p.m.

County roads closed

Bailey County's commissioners court voted to close about seven miles of county roads during Monday's regular session, acting upon a request that had first been presented to the court at its May 9 meeting.

The roads in question, located in south Bailey County, include CR 1163 between CR 51 and 71; CR 61 between FM 746 and CR 1173; and CR 71 between FM 746 and CR 1173.

A second application was received by the court to close CR 610

from CR 1173 to CR 1183.

During the closing process notarized waivers supporting the action were obtained from the majority of property owners in the area.

In other business, the court:

- Discussed a 25-year lease agreement with the Muleshoe Area Hospital District for the building occupied by the Bailey County EMS.

EMS director Jackey Wayne Burris had previously approached the hospital district

Council approves law enforcement grant

The Muleshoe City Council approved an agreement with the Texas Department of Public Safety to receive \$28,000 in grant funds for the purchase of records management software for the police department during Monday's regular meeting.

Similar action was taken earlier in the day

by the Bailey County Commissioners' Court regarding a grant \$58,000 for the Bailey County Sheriff's Department.

The software — from eForce, which includes a module for computer assisted dispatching, is a secure browser-based system that will allow the tracking of departmental records, dispatch locations and in the case of the

sheriff's department a jail management module.

"It's a big step with the state," Muleshoe Police Chief Brian Frieda said. "We're really excited about this."

When asked about the larger grant being received by the sheriff's department, Frieda explained that it was for the jail management module which isn't

be arrested and jailed.

The police chief also noted that all violations would be handled in county rather than municipal court.

"We're going to take it very seriously because of the conditions," Brunson said. "Unless we get significant rain, we will not have a fireworks display... period."

"If we find somebody in possession or using fireworks, they will be prosecuted," Brunson added.

Monday afternoon, Harrison, Frieda, County Attorney Jackie Claborn

II, and Sheriff Richard Wills met to discuss the enforcement of the declaration.

"Anyone caught violating the burn ban or the disaster declaration will be punished to the full extent of the law," Claborn said. "Additionally, there will be no warnings issued."

According to reports from counties surrounding Bailey County, including Roosevelt and Curry Counties in New Mexico, fireworks will not be available for purchase. However, in the event individuals

purchased fireworks somewhere else prior to the implementation of the disaster declaration, Chief Frieda warned against their transport, possession or use.

"Store them inside your residence until wet weather returns, and conditions permit their use," he said, "or turn them over to the Muleshoe Fire Department for disposal."

While the county burn ban will be in place until July 11, it was pointed out that the disaster declaration will remain in effect until it is lifted by the governor.

with the proposal, which he said was required before he could seek grant funds to expand the ems build to allow it to shelter a third ambulance, and received the approval of the MAHD board.

However, the lease agreement, which had been drawn up by the hospital district's attorney, wasn't provided to the court for consideration. The issue was to be placed on next month's agenda.

- Authorized stop signs to be placed at the intersection of CR 1008 and CR 14, which Precinct 2 Commissioner CE Grant described as a dangerous intersection following an accident in May involving students from Farwell High School.

- Approved a request that will allow a prepaid legal services program to be presented to county employees.

- Discussed the redistricting required after the 2010 census results. County Judge Sheri Harrison noted that about 50 voters would need to be moved from precinct 1 to precinct 3, and that the action would be placed on July's agenda.

- Approved an easement near the intersection of CR 1160 and CR 197 to allow Neal Caswell to bury an eight-inch pipe.

- Authorized the county to advertise for fuel bids.

- Approved the county treasurer's report for April, and received the treasurer's May report.

- Authorized County Judge Sherri Harrison to sign agreements with Apriss and the Texas Department of Public Safety

Funeral services were held on Monday, June 13, at the First Assembly of God Church with Pastor Leopoldo Ruedas and Angie Castillo officiating.

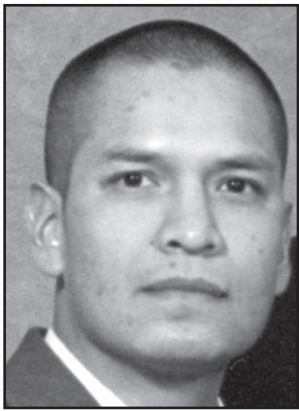
Burial followed at Muleshoe Memorial Park Cemetery under the direction of Ellis Funeral Home.

This is Thursday, May 27, 2011 — a few days before Monday the 30th — Memorial Day. A day that most people of America plan to honor in remembrance of the service rendered by those that served in some branch of the military.

I tried to volunteer about the time of the Battle of the Bulge in World War Two, but the Chairman of the Draft Board told me that I was needed more here at home than in the army. And he said, "If it gets to where we need you we will get you anyway." And that's where it rested.

Our son Randy tried to volunteer for service when we went to war in Iraq about 2001. But they told him he was too old. He was ready to do whatever he could do to help with our cause in the Middle East.

I have had no military training at all. But I believe, that is, we were to install compulsory military training, it would be good for the youth of our land, and for "we the people also."

It would reduce crime, improve the quality of our morals, and help people in a financial way.

The students, along with Muleshoe High School Athletic Trainer Josh Woolbright, traveled to Howard College in Big Spring to participate in a clinic for high school and junior college athletic trainers.

While they were at the clinic, they took part in ankle taping and backboard labs, as well as heard three different lectures.

At the end of the conference, one of the moderators talked to Coach Woolbright about our students.

The moderator is an assistant professor of athletic training at the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP).

He told Coach Woolbright that our students were already more proficient taping and more knowledgeable than the junior college students in attendance.

It would be time and money well spent.

It would improve the quality of our military, even though ours is probably the finest in the world, as it is. And I would say the young men, especially the boys, should inquire about the opportunities that are available in the military.

I was born in August of 1915, consequently I am merely 96 years of age. During my life we have had or been engaged in"

- World War One
- World War Two
- The Korean Conflict
- The war with Vietnam
- The war with Iraq #1
- The war with Iraq #2
- The war with Afghanistan

I don't profess to know the actual time that we were engaged in these seven wars. In fact, I understand that we are still engaged in two of them. And I don't know the number of soldiers we have lost through the years, nor the total

of those wounded, or the property lost, or the value of it.

Neither do I know the actual time we have spent at war during my ninety plus years. But I would say it is about fifty percent or one half.

I saw some figures a few days ago that called my attention to these things. And they are as follows:

In the strikes against the World Towers, and other attack, nearly three thousand people were killed.

In the wars against Iraq and Afghanistan 6000 American soldiers have been killed.

Frankly I can neither equalize or justify those figures. I can't see that we have broke even on those activities.

For I hear some of our leaders saying that as far as the government of Iraq is concerned today it is very little, if any, better than when Saddam Hussein ruled over them.

And it has been shown that when a soldier is killed at least 8 or 10 other

people are adversely affected in addition to the ones that are wounded, plus property damages and destruction, plus the cost of repair or replacement.

I fear that if we are not careful we might find ourselves at war when it would be better to be doing something else.

And my understanding is we won World War #1 and World War #2 and we may have been credited with having won War #1 with Iraq. But we have not won either one of the others.

We worked out an agreement, or settlement, with the Korean Conflict and the war with Vietnam.

That was done after about 10 years of fighting, and the loss of 58,000 service men and other losses beyond measure.

But the wars with Iraq and Afghanistan continue on.

Finally I would say that if anyone deserves our best wishes and honors, it is those men and women that bore the burdens of those battles; and their loved ones that bare the sadness of broken homes.

And I would also say; my feeling is that we who enjoy the goodness of this land, and its freedoms, and in whose hands the future rests, we owe it to each other to "stop" the mudslinging, to direct our thoughts to the good of all and return to the apprehension of logic and common sense — and do so while we have opportunity to do so.

MAHD Solicits Local Financing for Rural Health Clinic Expansion

Three years ago, the Muleshoe Area Hospital District started working on an addition to the Muleshoe Family Medicine Clinic. Due to other commitments, opportunities and circumstances, the expansion never got past purchasing the property. The District was awarded two grants, one from the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and one from the Muleshoe Economic Development Board. The recent play by Turley, entitled *The Escape*, was about the residents in the nursing home who sought to escape and travel to Hollywood.

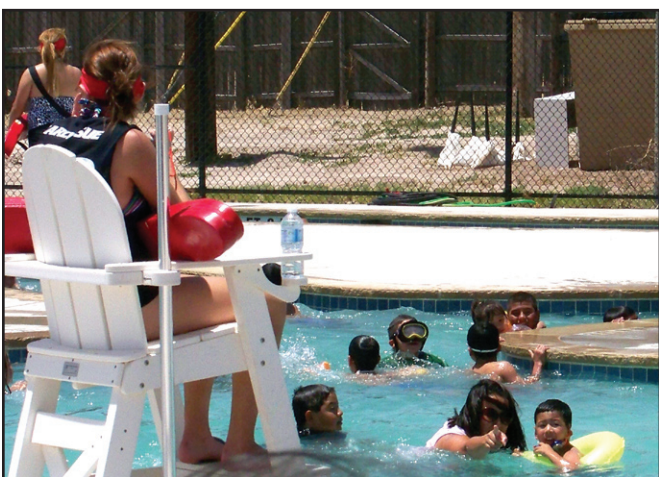
