

CATTLE TRADE STRONG

There was a slight increase in the receipts of cattle today over last Monday and the corresponding day a year ago both here and in the aggregate marketing at the five leading centers, but the good tone of the market was not affected, the tendency of prices still being toward a higher level. At this point the estimated supply was 1,800 head as compared with 1,323 the opening day last week and 1,514 for the same day a year ago. At the five markets the total run was 35,400 head, of which 20,000 were early posted and 15,400 a week ago the five markets had 33,700 head while a year ago the same points reported 31,800.

SHORT IN CALIFORNIA.

A. E. de Rieques Reports Few Cattle Being Fed on Pacific Coast.

Denver, Colo., April 15.—Record-Stockman: "There is a big shortage of cattle in California, and also a big shortage of feed," said A. E. de Rieques, who has just returned from a month's trip to the Pacific coast country. Mr. de Rieques took his big automobile with him and made numerous trips over the country out of Los Angeles, and in that way had an excellent opportunity to note live stock conditions. "The California rainy season, which should have begun three months ago, did not begin until about three weeks ago," continued Mr. de Rieques, "and there has consequently been little grass. Grass cattle are two or three months late, and there are very few cattle on feed out there. Cattle on feed are bringing \$7.00 in Los Angeles now, and they will be hunting all over the country for cattle to supply the markets out there soon."

Mr. de Rieques came back by way of El Paso, Texas, and says they have had heavy rains throughout Arizona, and that country looks like a garden. It is as yet problematical whether many cattle will be gotten out of Old Mexico this spring or not, according to Mr. de Rieques. Should the revolutionists continue in control of the Chihuahua country, it is probable that some cattle may be gotten, as the rebels want the \$2.50 gold tax they have imposed on every head of cattle taken from that country, to assist in carrying on their warfare. Should they be beaten, however, and scattered, but at the same time not fully controlled, getting the stuff out would be a difficult matter, even if there were any left to get out after the scattering hands got through with them.

Mr. de Rieques reports a great shortage of yearlings in the southern country and says this will no doubt be reflected in a shortage of matured beef cattle two or three years from now.

ROAD HELPS BEET GROWERS

Farmers of Avondale, Colo., Realize On Their Petition.

Pueblo, April 13.—At the meeting of the board of county commissioners a new road in the vicinity of Avondale was established. The road is made a part of the county system of highways, and although used for travel by the farmers in that section, has never been in good condition. It will be widened and improved so that this prosperous beet section will be furnished with a good road to afford means of transportation.

The new section of county road branches off from the Santa Fe trail east of Avondale, runs south about two miles, then takes a westerly direction for about four miles. Here it turns back north and connects with the Santa Fe trail again. The vicinity of Avondale is a fertile section and is quite thickly populated. Beet culture is the principal industry, and the farmers in that neighborhood petitioned the county commissioners recently for improvement of the highway so that transportation of their crop would be facilitated. They had considerable trouble marketing their crops last year, after the road had been badly cut up by the many beet wagons.

Last year many miles of roads were constructed in Pueblo county, and according to the plans formulated up to date, equally as extensive work will be carried out this summer. A large force of convict laborers is at work on the north road and within sixty days this stretch of highway will be completed to the El Paso county line.

No county in the state has done more road work than Pueblo within the last two years, and from one side of the country to the other it is common talk among travelers that Pueblo county has some of the finest roads in the west.

Row Over Road Taxes. Cameron (Mo.) Sun: A matter in which the people of this vicinity are very much interested is the case of the Cameron Special Road District versus the County Court, in which the Commissioners have brought suit against the county court for road taxes paid on the property in the district amounting to \$7,000 per year. The county court claims the district is entitled to only \$1,500 and claims all the road taxes paid in the district as well as its proportion of the road. The district is entitled to no per cent of the taxes paid by the railroads and only 10c on the remainder of the tax-

able wealth of the district. The Commissioners claim they are entitled to taxes apportioned by the legislature for the road purposes in the county. The case will be finally submitted in banc to the Supreme Court on April 26th after which a decision may be looked for at any time.

HOW TO FIGHT CUTWORMS.

Method of Combating Ravages of Most Common Garden Pest.

Washington, D. C., April 15.—Tomatoes, cabbage, sweet potatoes and other vegetables and garden plants, and especially those which are started under glass and transplanted, are subject to serious injury by cutworms. They appear sometimes in great numbers in spring and early summer and frequently do severe injury before their ravages are noticed. The method of attack is to cut off the young plants at about the surface of the ground, and as these insects are of large size and voracious feeders they are capable of destroying many plants in a single night, frequently more than they can devour. During the past two years these insects, working generally throughout the United States, destroyed hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of crops. By timely application of remedies, however, it was demonstrated by the Department of Agriculture through field agents and others of the Bureau of Entomology engaged in the investigation of insects injurious to truck crops and sugar beets in some of the principal trucking regions, notably in Tidewater Virginia, in southern Texas, in the vicinity of Rocky Ford, Colo., in southern California, in the vicinity of Sacramento, Cal., in Stark county, Ind., and in some other regions that these insects can be readily controlled, large areas being successfully treated. The usual method of control is by the use of poisoned baits.

Take a bushel of dry bran, add 1 pound of arsenic or Paris green, and mix it thoroughly into a mash with 8 gallons of water, in which has been

Dr. Crum Has Just Returned From a Trip Through These Beautiful Florida Lands.

Dr. Crum says: "The Everglades will not only become the vegetable garden of the winter market of the United States, but will also supply the tropic fruits of the Eastern and Central States. Miami is within 40 hours by rail from New York, which gives it an advantage over every other fruit belt in setting its products into that great market without loss. Under the pure food law, no fruit is permitted to be shipped green and to ripen in cold storage. This proved a set-back to California, but has made an increased demand for Florida East Coast products."

BIG PROFITS MADE.
Even a 10-acre plot, under intelligent cultivation, will net you from \$2,000 to \$3,000 a year. If you work it yourself, one man can care for 10 acres in vegetables without an assistant. This statement is under rather than over the actual experiences of men now raising truck gardens there.

It is the only place in the United States where crops are ready for the market 90 days after planting, and two crops a year of vegetables can be grown on one patch of ground; then the land turned over to growing stock feed for the market.

stirred half a gallon of sorghum, or other cheap molasses. After the mash has stood several hours, scatter it in lumps of about the size of a marble over the fields where injury is beginning to appear and about the bases of the plants set out. Apply late in the day so as to place the poison about the plants over night, which is the time when the cut worms are active. Apply a second time if necessary.

When cutworms occur in unusual abundance which happens locally and sometimes generally, in some seasons, they exhaust their food supply and are driven to migrate to other fields. This they do, literally in armies, assuming what is called the army-worm habit. At such times it is necessary to treat them as we do army worms. While the methods which have been advised are valuable in such cases, these remedies may be too slow to destroy all the cutworms and we, therefore, have to employ other methods. These include trenching, ditching, the lowering of deep furrows in advance of the traveling cut worms to trap them, and the dragging of logs or brush through the furrow. If the trenches can be filled with water, the addition of a small quantity of kerosene so as to form a thin scum on the surface will prove fatal. In extreme cases barriers of fence boards are erected and the tops smeared with tar or other sticky substances to stop the cutworms as they attempt to crawl over.
