Section seven of the

hospital district's by-laws read as follows:

Any director or officer may be removed from office Area Hospital District in the following manner: is expected to be well Any board member may attended as members of bring charges against any director or officer by filing in writing with the secretary of the District, together with a petition signed by any two members of the board requesting removal of the director or officer in question.

Such removal shall be through an impeachment voted on at the next regular or special meeting of the board and shall be effective if approved by a vote of the majority of the board members present at such meeting.

> The director or officer against whom such charges have been filed shall be informed in writing of such charges five (5) days prior to the meeting and shall such meeting to be heard in person or by counsel and to present witnesses and the person or persons bringing the charges against opportunity.

By 1978, the FDA approved Tamoxifen for treating estrogen receptor-positive breast cancer — which allowed Bernard Fisher, MD, Richard Love, MD, and V. Craig Jordan, PhD to develop and carry out the first trial of Tamoxifen to prevent recurrence in breast cancer survivors.

To this day, Rhonda and Garrison continue supporting the Relay For Life of Bailey County. Rhonda is serving as the event chair, and Garrison is a team captain.

When given the opportunity, both of them share their story for the importance of cancer research at area church events, civic organizations and Society events.

#### MAHD Solicits Local Financing for Rural Health Clinic Expansion

Three years ago, the Muleshoe Area Hospital District started working on an addition to the Muleshoe Family Medicine Clinic. Due to other commitments, opportunities and circumstances, the expansion never got past purchasing the property. The District was awarded two grants, one from the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and one from the Muleshoe Economic Development Board. The federal grant of \$235,000 is about to expire; therefore, MAHD is asking local citizens to assist in financing the project in order to secure the grant. A condition of the grant is that the property cannot be used as collateral for a loan trom a lending institution.






