




BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county.

"If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property-tax-paying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections solong as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation.



ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:
"Section 10(a). The Legislature may authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which shall include all or part of the West Columbia. Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts and the other co-terminous with the Sweeny Independent School District. The maximum tax rate submitted hall be sufficient to discharge such biligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to acquire, construct, saintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the acquisition, construction, purchase, repair renovation of improvements and nitially equipping the same and such holds shall be payable from said shorem taxes authorized under this constitution and the laws of the State of Texas. Titus County is hereby

authorized and empowered to levy, assess and collect a tax not exceeding twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in said County in any one year for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on any bonds issued by said County for the purpose of constructing and equipping a home or homes for the aged persons in said County and to pay the maintenance and operation expenses a home or homes for the aged persons in said County and to pay the maintenance and operation expenses thereof, provided said bonds and tax shall have been authorized at an election or elections held for that purpose by a majority of the qualified electors of Titus County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election. This provision shall be self-enacting and no enabling legislation hereunder shall be required. Any bond issued hereunder shall be issued in accordance with the General Laws except as herein otherwise provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Morday in November, 1962, at which thereon:



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
