There has been a gradual leveling of these extremes within the last quarter century, however, owing to the improvement, made in the methods and machinery required to turn out

This has lowered the price of fireproof construction just in proportion to the increased cost of lumber, so that now a fireproof superstructure for a how a hreproof super-structure for a home can be erected for within 10 to 15 per cent of the cost of a wooden frame building of like character. And still there is a probability of the cost of fireproof construction becoming cheaper when masons and builders become more familiar with the handling of this class of building material.
