Such large and long-time sales of national forest timber as that to the California company are a new development in the forest service.

The national forests contain, in all, the equivalent of nearly 600 billion feet of timber now of merchantable size, besides young growth for future harvest.

"No business organization would undertake the heavy investment necessary in such cases unless the handling of a large body of timber and sufficient period in which to remove it under practical logging conditions are assured.

"For several years the forest service has been selling in the neighborhood of a million dollars worth of national forest timber per year, but this combined with that is for free use is only about one-eighth of what might be cut without reducing the permanent stock of the forests.

BIG ROUNDUP PLANNED MOVEMENT OF 50,000 CATTLE FROM MEXICO TO TEXAS AN IMMENSE UNDERTAKING.

Not long ago there was a serious discussion in the columns of one of the leading live stock journals of the country on the problem of the best method of driving herds of cattle to market, particularly when they ranged in size from twenty-five miles to fifty animals and had to be taken over a highway fifteen to twenty miles.

The Sautera Ranch embraces two million acres and is practically unfenced. Fifty thousand head of cattle roam over all parts of it.

That the task of gathering these cattle together and driving them across the country for more than 500 miles to the Texas ranches of the purchasers will be fraught with many difficulties is well understood in advance.

It is expected that several weeks will be required to comb the brush and round up the cattle at some central point. More than 100 cowboys will be employed in the roundup work.

The worst part of the drive will be before the cattle enter the country, although the country there is almost wholly undeveloped.
