DAIRY MAIDS FOR SHOW.

Nations Best to Be Gathered at Chicago This Week.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 22.—More than 1,000 blue blooded cows, tons of yellow butter, and the prettiest dairy maids that can be found throughout the entire country, will vie for honors at the national dairy show, which begins on Thursday at the International amphitheater in the stock yards, and continues until Nov. 2.

All preparations for the great national show of the dairy industry practically were concluded yesterday. There will be nothing missing when the doors of the amphitheater open, Col. W. E. Skinner, manager of the exposition, says there are more entries this year than ever before, and there will be featured galore for the person seeking new attractions.

Now the least interesting of the numerous events will be the horse show which takes place every night. There will be ten evening, and blooded animals from all over the country will be shown. There also will be the national championship event of the turner, the largest and the largest clubs in the United States will strive for athletic honors. Pushball contests on horseback, which excited so much interest in previous shows, also will be among the daily features.

The names of the judges in the different dairy events will be announced this week, as the association has not completed the list at this time. They will be men of international reputation, it is said, and will be selected for their knowledge of the live stock and dairy industry.

Both the federal government and the municipal authorities will unite in presenting to the public research work of years on the profitable methods to be used by the farmer and dairyman, giving practical demonstrations of results to be obtained in following certain lines of breeding.

As butter will be one of the mainstays of the show, there will be a butter making contest, in which any one from any part of the country may compete. One of the large milk companies also will install a complete pasteurization plant, which will demonstrate just how milk is treated before it goes to the consumer.

Instead of the regulation "bar" usually the adjunct of such shows, the daily exposition will install a "milk tube," where thirsty visitors will be served milk from the finest blue ribbon cows in the world. There will be all kinds of milk continually on draft, and one may drink the product of one's favorite cow. There also will be great quantities of ice cold buttermilk.

More than a dozen national and state organizations, including cheese-makers, dairymen, separator, churn and refrigerator manufacturers, are to be in convention in Chicago during the dairy show.

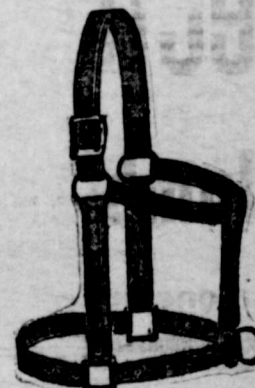

ORDER NOW BEFORE PRICES ADVANCE.

That high-power Hertzian wave emitted by modern wireless telegraph stations are capable of setting up high electro-motive forces in metal structures in the immediate vicinity of the stations was recently shown in Paris.

Some workmen on a section of telegraph line experienced severe shocks when they touched the wires. Investigation showed that the source was the great Eiffel Tower wireless station.

A small item was overlooked in the bookkeeping department of the United States navy. It was the charge for guns installed on the battleships Florida and Utah. The item was for the trifling sum of \$1,800,000.

The boat is 500 feet in length, 55 feet broad, 100 feet over the guards and has a molded depth of 22 feet. The craft is entirely dependent on her side wheels, while the Great Eastern was also supplied with a propeller.
