As was expected, the sharp break in hog prices during the first half of the week had a tendency to curtail movement of porkers and today 1... 280..5 50 witnessed a slight reaction in the trade. Combined receipts at the five markets were 11,000 short of the supply in sight a week ago. This had the effect of checking the headlong plunge of prices down the taboggan, seliers being able to dictate more favorable terms of exchange. With advices from outside markets decidedly more encouraging salesmen here stuck for higher prices and after the usual sparring succeeded in establishing the market at a generally 5c higher set of values, Exceptions were noted both ways, however, some of the commoner grades showing comparatively little strength while a few deals involving medium and heavy grades looked to higher than yesterday. Practically everything in at 11 o'clock had been sold. A few loads of late arrivals did not find the demand quite as keen but there was not enough change to cut.

The company even went so far as to purchase blooded breeding stock in other states for the purpose of going into the breeding business itself, that it might have blooded hogs and plenty of them to sell to Texas farmers for breeding purposes, in this way to bring about a revival of the hog industry. "Conditions must change in the breeding of live stock in Texas or the present high prices for meat must go still higher. The good old days when thousands of head were branded each year on the open range can never come again in America, hence it is up to the farmer to now feed himself and the remainder of humanity.

"In Nueces county in the early '80s I was manager of the old Laurel Leaf ranch, and we would handle from 19,000 to 22,000 head of cattle annually; other ranches on the coast and in western Texas did likewise, Now in these latter days the farmers must breed graded cattle and hogs, faiten them and send them to market.

"Oklahoma farmers are sending their hogs to the Fort Worth market" of the nation.

"Open the window," ordered the arhitect, and shout 'Police!' The burglar had no alternative but to obey, and so summoned the officer by whom he was to be arrested.


Run a Walking Stick Farm. Of the many curious farms that have been established in our peaceful countryside, surely a walking-stick farm is the most curious, relates London Answers.



Instead of the corn fields, pasture land and root crops usually expected on a farm, the walkingstick acres present the appearance of long, neat rows of tiny sapling trees, some four years old, others younger. Quite a forest of walking sticks may
