FARMING INTEREST GROWS

Alabama Has Awakened to Importance of Agriculture.

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 4.—People of Alabama have experienced a great awakening to the importance of agriculture. The annual agricultural exposition at Montgomery, October 18-26, will be never a time in the history of the state when more general interest was manifested in farming than right now.

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By a joint arrangement between the government and the state, a farm demonstration agent is maintained in nearly every county of the state. The agent in Montgomery county alone has fifty-nine farms under his direction. These farms are training schools for all of the farmers, and their efficiency is shown in the increasing yields of all of the lands.

COLORADO'S BIG FARM YIELD

State Vastly Enriched by Agricultural Success This Year.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Nov. 4.—The capitalist, the builder, the business man and the manufacturer must all give the laurels to the farmer as the greatest constructorist who has appeared in Colorado within the last sixty days. For the farmer has brought to the state between \$159,999,999 and \$209,999,999 in new wealth. This, according to the report given by the state land board, represents the value of 1912 crops. From every section of the state come reports of bumper crops of wheat, corn, alfalfa, clover, sugar beets, and other crops.

The so-called "back-to-the-land" movement has hit Alabama hard, and agriculture is claiming first attention in the minds of all classes of the people.

A DAY'S FEED 22 CENTS.

Here's An Inexpensive Ration for the Family Horse.

Manhattan, Kan., Nov. 4.—The cost of keeping a horse through the winter may be made to vary between \$16 and \$70, according to the kinds of hay and grain fed. The foregoing estimate was made by Dr. C. W. McCampbell, assistant professor of animal husbandry at the Kansas agricultural college. Dr. McCampbell gives four rations that are good for winter, counting from the first of October to the first of May. Oats and prairie hay is considered the standard ration. Feeding 12 pounds of hay and 12 pounds of the grain a day for seven months would cost \$70—\$50 for the oats and \$20 for hay. This makes a good combination, and the horse will be in good flesh in the spring.

If corn be fed with prairie hay—10 pounds of corn and 14 pounds of alfalfa—the winter's supply will cost \$60, the estimate being made with the present prices. This is practically all that is needed for the horse. If food values be taken into consideration, the corn will be found more expensive than the oats. The corn is more heating, and in the summer it is not so good for an animal that does much driving.

Alfalfa hay may be substituted for prairie hay when fed with corn. Feeding 10 pounds of alfalfa and 10 pounds of corn a day, a horse may be kept seven months at a cost of \$48. This combination is to be recommended for the family horse, or any other horse that does not do very hard or extremely rapid work. Another good feed is five pounds of prairie hay, 10 pounds of alfalfa, and eight pounds of corn. It is not having this ration should be able to stand hard driving and delivery work. All these prices were estimated with grain and hay at present prices. Near large markets, the prices are not very different from those in Manhattan. Horses boarded at livery barns by the month usually are charged for at the rate of from \$8 to \$13 a head.

The company at Pine Bluff has been engaged as general manager of the plant of the Arkansas Packing Company at Pine Bluff and as a result many of the stockmen in North Texas are taking a great deal of interest in the project.

THE MIDWINTER SHOW.

National Western Stock Show to Be Larger and Better Than Ever.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 4.—The dates for the eighth annual National Stock Show at Denver have been fixed for January 23 to 25 inclusive, and plans for the big event are already well under way. There will be several new features in the show this winter, including a new department for industrial exhibits, and the enlargement of the old feed and forage section to include all kinds of farm crop exhibits, and hereafter this will be known as the "Agricultural Section."

HUNTERS OUT FOR QUAIL.

Game More Plentiful Than in Years in the Ozarks.

Springfield, Mo., Nov. 4.—With quail more plentiful this fall than in many years, hundreds of sportsmen will invade the fields in the Ozark country today. Weather conditions during the spring and summer were ideal for the propagation of the birds, and every county reports an abundance of unusually large coveys. The closed season was observed more closely this year, farmers say, and this tended to permit the birds to breed unmolested.

GOODS EXEMPT FROM SEIZURE

Ordinary Householder Will Be Surprised to Learn How Much He May Legally Retain.

To protect the honest debtor from oppression at the hands of remorseless creditors, it has been the policy of the law to designate certain articles deemed necessary for human sustenance as being "exempt from execution," that is to say, the sheriff may not seize them to satisfy a debt.

New York's law on the subject was passed in 1828 as part of the revised statutes and has been re-enacted from time to time with but slight change, although living conditions have, of course, altered considerably in the past ninety years.

As a result of this situation, the New York flat-dweller will find, if he looks up the law providing for his "exemptions from execution," that however much the high cost of living may enslave him, the sheriff will never be able to take from him any of the following articles which may be discovered in his flat:

All wearing apparel, beds, bedsteads and bedding, necessary for the judgment debtor and the family; all necessary cooking utensils; one table, six chairs, six knives, six forks, six spoons, six plates, six tea cups, six saucers, one sugar dish, one milk pot, one tea pot, one crane and its appendages, one pair of andirons, one coal scuttle, one shovel and one pair of tongs, one lamp and one candlestick.—New York American.

Famous Songs.

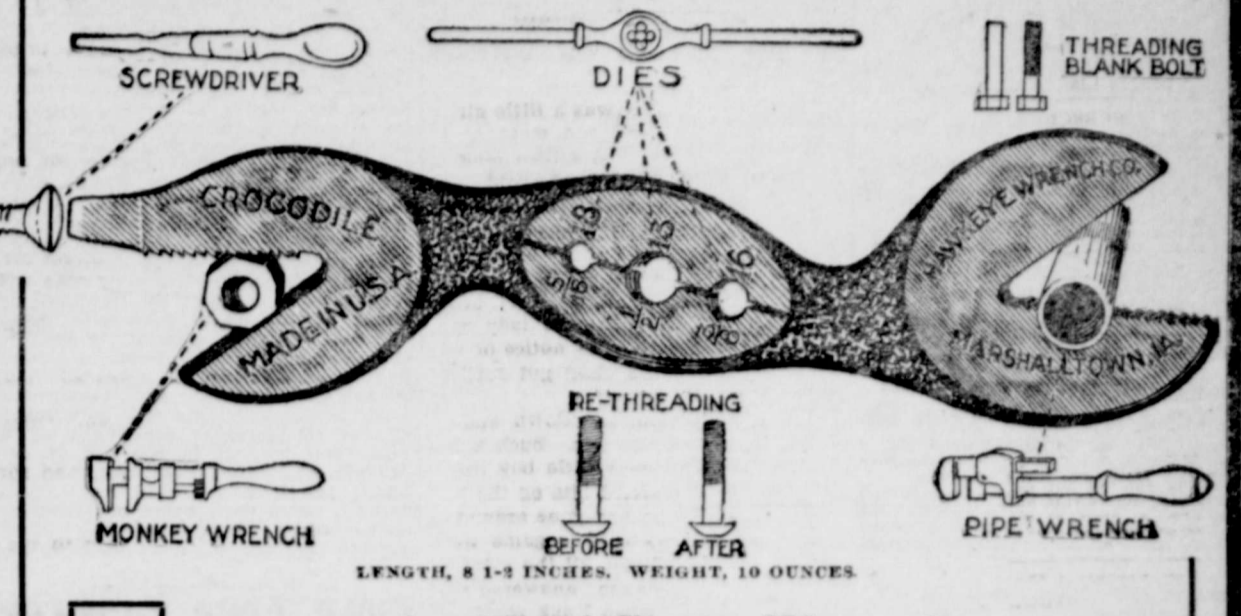
It has been said that the late H. Trotere, who composed such famous songs as "In Old Madrid," "The Deathless Army," "Ashore" and "Go to Sea," could claim the distinction of being the world's quickest composer, and there was certainly some justification for this claim.

His beautiful song, "Ashore," was both written and composed in 40 minutes in a restaurant, while the strains of "In Old Madrid" (of which 750,000 copies have been sold) was also the result of a sudden inspiration. The melody came to the composer while he was on his way from the Royal Aquarium; lest it should escape him, he rushed into a public house in Rochester row, seized a biscuit bag and wrote down the air. H. Trotere is also said to have composed "The Bow of the H.L.I." written a letter about it and run a quarter of a mile to post it, all in eight minutes.

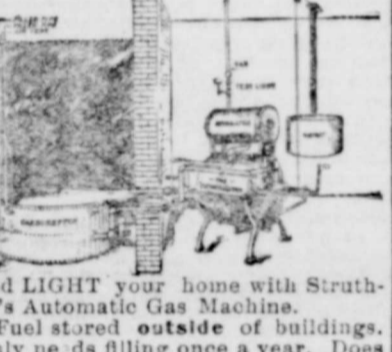
