COOKING RECIPES. Milk Chocolate—A cupful of milk; two heaping cupfuls of sugar; two squares of chocolate. Melt the chocolate in the milk and add the sugar. Beat in the egg yolks and until you have a creamy compound—smooth and firm—and then drop from a teaspoon upon buttered or waxed paper.

DON'TS IN CARE OF STOCK

Some Pertinent Advice by Colorado Station Expert. Prof. C. L. Baines of the Colorado Agricultural college at Fort Collins in a list of "Don'ts" regarding the care of live stock says: Don't water a horse soon after feeding him grain. Don't feed a large quantity of hay to a horse that is afflicted with heaves. Don't change the grain ration abruptly. Don't keep idle horses on full feed of grain.

HASN'T CHOSEN A CABINET

President-Elect Says Mind is Open as Regards Appointments. Princeton, N. J., Nov. 9.—President-elect Woodrow Wilson has not decided upon the personnel of his future cabinet and he intends to keep his mind open on the subject for a long time before he takes office. He was manifestly concerned regarding certain speculations emanating from Princeton with respect to the probable make-up of his cabinet. To put an end if possible to all gossip about cabinet appointments, he issued the following statement:

WORK ON GARDEN NOW.

Manhattan, Kan., Nov. 9.—The good gardens of 1912 are being made now. Not that this is the time to sow seed or even lay out the beds, but the first work for next year's garden should be done now. Good gardeners, says Albert Dickson, head of the horticultural department of the Kansas Agricultural college, are removing their tomato vines, potato vines, and corn stalks and either putting them in a compost heap or burning them. Burning them is the quickest and most sanitary way of getting rid of this trash, but where humus is scarce it should be piled up in a corner of the garden and watered, when it will be in shape to spread over the garden in the spring. In a large garden a well sharpened disk run over the ground will cut this trash so that it may be plowed under. In a small town garden the compost heap is not particularly desirable. With the ground cleared, a ton or two of well-rotted manure should be spread over a plot 50 feet square. The ground then should be plowed. If a ground has been plowed in the fall with the plow, it should be plowed in the fall because of the tendency of the soil below. Blowing is less likely to occur in ground left unplowed than in ground plowed in the fall. Good, heavy mulch of coarse manure and the coarse parts raked off before the garden is planted in the spring will be also helpful in clearing up an early backdoor landscape.
