WOMAN IN JUNGLES

Mrs. Kerr Has Spent Many Years in South America.

No Fear of Hostile Natives—Has Collection of Many Specimens of Rare Tropical Birds and Animals for Museums and Exhibits.

New York.—A woman must have two qualities to be a successful naturalist, writes a woman who knows what she is talking about, for she tells in the Housekeeper an extraordinary tale of feminine adventure.

"I can narrow my eyes along the steel-blue barrel of a gun. I can look without fear into the sullen face of a hostile native.

"I do not know. There are the Mathilde Motants—they flirt with death in the clouds. There are the Annie Pecks—they court it over the edge of an abyss.

"I never know which one of my enemies will claim me—save beasts, alligators, hostile natives, possibly starvation, or the pestilent fever which reaches out greedy fingers from the dark swamps.

"My wants are simple—a gun, some poison, and any old thing to eat. I wear bloomers, a long shooting jacket with pockets everywhere, and a rubber hat to protect me from the tropical rains.

"Sometimes when there are savage beasts about I climb into the tree trunks and spend the night with the monkeys for companions.

"I start out with my gun over my shoulder from the quaint old city of Cartagena, where I make my headquarters between hunting trips.

"As I push upstream in my little canoe past gorgeous flowering vines—which I know enough to leave alone, for death lurks in their glossy folds—under great gloomy overhanging trees with immense vines trailing down to the water, a strange bird flies into the branches of a tree ahead of me.

"There is a sudden splash, a terrific blow over the bow of the canoe which almost shivers it to pieces, and my gaze is suddenly brought down from the bird to a big alligator which has been asleep on the shore and which I did not notice.

"I don't mount the birds. I make what are in museum parlance called skins. The rarest bird I find in Colombia and the most difficult to secure is the Jabiru (Mycteria Americana), five feet tall, with a spread of wings of 100 inches, a snowy, satiny white, with a band of crimson wattles about the neck.

HOPE FOR MERCHANT MARINE

Naval Architects and Engineers Think It May Yet Come.

New York, Nov. 25.—Renewed hope that the United States merchant marine may become a factor in the world's commerce was expressed at the annual meeting of naval architects and marine engineers today.

The sinking of the Titanic had taught naval architects a lesson, he said. While much stress has been laid on the need of more life boats since the loss of the Titanic, it was infinitely more important to make the steamer itself safer with sub-divided decks and stronger platings.

JESUS IS GOD'S GIFT TO ALL HUMANITY

Salvation Is of God's Love, Not of Justice or Necessity.

Misunderstanding of What Constitutes the Divine Penalty For Sin Has Mailed Us In Respect to Every Feature of God's Program For Our Recovery From the Penalty.



Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 24.—Pastor Russell is here. We report one of his addresses from the text, "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable Gift."—II Corinthians ix. 15. The Pastor said that in order to appreciate the Scriptures on all subjects, we must handle the Word of God honestly. We must recognize that our Lord Jesus is one person and the Father another person.

The Scriptures declare that the Redeemer took the nature of men in order to redeem sinners; but that in Him there was no sin. Only a sinless one could give to God a Ransom for Adam, and thus redeem from destruction, not only Adam, but all his posterity, involved in sin and death through him. The speaker then showed that God set before our Lord a great joy, the influence of which led Jesus to endure cheerfully the bitter experiences of His earthly life. This joy is intimated to have been: (1) His pleasure in doing the Father's will; (2) His privilege of "bringing many sons to glory"—the Church; (3) His pleasure and joy in being by and by the world's Restorer, delivering them from the power of Satan, sin and death.

Our Lord Jesus pursued an opposite course, and demonstrated His loyalty and obedience. St. Paul affirms that although he was Lucifer, yet he was humble, and "meditated not a usurpation," as the Greek text declares. (Phil. ii. 6.) He thought not by robbery to be equal with God. On the contrary, our Lord willingly accepted the Divine proposal that He should be humbled to the human plane for a time, in order to carry out the Father's Plan. To the Church, Jesus is God's unspeakable Gift. He is indeed a Gift to the whole world, unspeakable in value, but He is more to the Church than to the world. To His footstep followers, He is the "Captain of the Salvation," their Bridgeman, their "Elder Brother," their great High Priest. Through Him they are privileged to be the Royal Priesthood. Through the merit of the sacrifice of Christ, they are privileged to "present their bodies living sacrifices, holy, acceptable unto God."

TO REBUILD NOTED TEMPLE

Scheme of Freemasons and Opinions of Jews on Reconstructing Solomon's Edifice. London.—The scheme of the Freemasons to rebuild the Temple of Solomon at Jerusalem has aroused much sentimental interest in Jewish quarters here, and much doubt is expressed as to whether the project will ever be realized.

Some two years ago it was announced that Chester had decided to form a lodge of research to meet at Jerusalem, and to be known as the Lodge of King Solomon's temple. Its members were to be drawn from all parts of the world, but in view of the unsettled state of affairs then prevailing in the Turkish empire the lodge was consecrated in the province of Chester, and met under the jurisdiction of the grand lodge of England.

As to the intended uses of the projected temple, details are necessarily incomplete, but however generous the financial support that has been placed at the disposal of the promoters of the scheme, however skilled the artificers, it will be difficult to convince the Jew that even modern arts and crafts can reproduce the stateliness and the splendor of the original temple, a splendor that is considered by some to have been exaggerated. The scheme appears in one respect to anticipate the yearnings of the pious Jew, who in his devotions prays daily for the restoration of Jerusalem, and incidentally to the rebuilding of the temple: "O dwell in the midst of Thy City of Jerusalem, as Thou hast spoken, and speedily establish the Throne of David therein. O build it speedily in our days, a structure of everlasting frame."

BEATING SAVES MAN'S LIFE

Electrician Pronounced Dead by Physicians is Restored by Ambulance Attendants After Getting Shock.

San Francisco, Cal.—An hour's heroic treatment brought back signs of life here into the body of Bert Edgar, an electrician, after he had been pronounced dead from a shock of 2,200 volts of electricity. Besides the shock, Edgar was suffering from a fractured skull, received when the electricity threw him from a platform ten feet above the cement floor of a basement of a downtown office building. When the accident happened a physician in the building pronounced Edgar dead. Herman Kresmayer and Adam Baker, ambulance attendants, decided, however, that the cessation of heart action was due to the terrific shock and might be restored. Baker and a patrolman ran Edgar's apparently lifeless body up and down the street, with the feet touching the pavement, while Kresmayer struck him about the chest and shoulders and all three shouted continuously into his ears. After an hour of nearly continuous treatment of this sort, interruptions being caused by well-meaning passers-by, who thought Edgar was being beaten up, Edgar showed signs of life and was rushed to the hospital. He was found to have a good chance to recover.

WHALE CHASE CAUSES DEATH

Captain Watches Boats and Falls In to the Sea When Heart Falls From Excitement.

San Francisco, Cal.—The whaler schooner Letitia, which left here April 27 last for a cruise in the waters of Southeastern Alaska, returned with her flag at half mast as a token of respect to the memory of Captain J. A. Macomber, late master of the vessel, who died August 2 last, induced, the officers believe, by excitement. The captain was in the rigging directing two boats in the chase of a whale which had been sighted spouting near by. He fell into the water, where his body floated, but, although he was picked up within a few minutes, he was dead. He was buried at sea the following day. He was fifty-one years of age, and is survived by a widow and two children.
