COMPARATIVELY LIGHT MONDAY SUPPLY CHANGED HANDS AT STEADY RATES.

GENERAL QUALITY PLAIN

Cows and Heifers Steady to 10c Higher—Bulls Active—Calves Steady—Stockers and Feeders Meet Brisk Demand.

As anticipated late last week, the live stock show proved a magnet in drawing a heavy run of cattle, hogs and sheep to Chicago for the opening day of the week.

Receipts at this point included a rather light quota of steers and aside from one or two lots the quality was rather plain, warranted and medium to fair short feed classes predominating.

As usual with beefish reports coming from the primary market trade did not start out very lively but if buyers had any intention of buying values here they were disappointed.

As the inquiry for beef on the hoof was sufficiently broad to care for everything offered at prices steady with the close of last week while the movement was not termed particularly active, most of the steers on offer were turned before noon.

HOG PRICES EASE OFF

EASTERN MARKET WEAKENS UNDER HEAVY RUN—LOCAL DECLINE IN SYMPATHY.

BREAK OF 5 TO 10c NOTED

Top Hogs at \$7.50, With Bulk of Sales Hanging From \$7.65 to \$7.72 1/2—Pig Values Are Forced Down.

Over half of the total supply of 92,300 hogs in sight at the five markets today were on sale at Chicago, that point reporting 53,000 head.

Estimates called for around 5,500 hogs. Combined receipts at the five markets were 16,000 greater than a week ago.

Prices for hogs averaging 140 lbs. and up ranged from \$7.65 to \$7.72 1/2, with the bulk selling at \$7.65 to \$7.80, a week ago at \$7.75 to \$7.90, a year ago at \$5.90 to \$6.25, two years ago at \$7.30 to \$7.35, three years ago at \$8.05 to \$8.35, and four years ago at \$5.25 to \$5.50.
