Journal Endorses Courthouse Bonds

The Muleshoe Journal favors the proposed \$360,000 bond election to remodel the courthouse and build a new county jail.

We believe:

1. That remodeling is badly needed and that the present jail is a disgrace. 2. That the \$360,000 proposed maximum cost is

not excessive.

The original figure, a purely tentative one, was for \$290,000. This, however, covered ONLY the actual construction costs. It did not include such items as:

Architect's fees; state laws require that an architect be hired for any county structure to cost more than \$2,000; thus the fee at 5 percent of the total cost, would amount to \$14,500.

Bondsman's fees are \$2,500. Contingency fund, a "safety" item included on all

Removal of offices and rent for the time the struc-

building programs, is \$14,500.

ture is undergoing remodeling, would run to \$6,000, a conservative figure.

Equipment would cost \$28,000. This includes not just office equipment, but such items as modern counters, etc. The clerk's office also would be made with vault doors.

Thus, altogether, the cost is not out of reason. The Journal feels that the \$360,000 figure is not ex-

Tax raises to provide for the bond repayment would be within reason. True taxes would rise slightly since valuation also would have to be increased. A \$1,000 valuation would be increased to \$1,250, raising the taxes to be paid from \$9.50 to \$11.87. And taxes would be raised from \$190 a year to \$237.50 on property originally valued at \$20,000. Valuation of such property would be boosted to \$25,000.

As urban complexes developed the citizens realized that dumping trash in the streets and hoping that it would rain and wash away soon turned the city into a huge dump.

Today the problem is still with us. Cities pay out a major part of their annual budgets to pick up trash and dispose of it in a sanitary manner.

To better cope with this problem the Texas State Department of Health conducts a series

WAGE EARNER'S PLAN

There is an alternative to bankruptcy. Relief from constant harrassment by creditors and threats of suits and garnishment of bank accounts can be found by the filing of a Wage Earner's Plan in the federal district court under Chapter XII of the Bankruptcy Act.

A debtor can request the court to stop all suits and garnishments during a three-year period while he pays into the court to satisfy all of his debts over this extended period of time. A Wage Earner's Plan has

certain advantages over bank-

There is no stigma of having avoided one's debts. Every creditor is paid in full.

A debtor is taught, under court supervision, to reserve a ceris in effect.

A debtor is allowed to keep application of the law.) his mortgaged property unless the court decides it is too expensive for his income.

A person who has filed bankruptcy within six years and is again being pressed by his creditors, may file a Wage Earner's Plan. The law does not permit him to go into bankruptcy within this six-year period.

debts. If a debtor simply does not have enough money to live on and still pay his obligations in full, it is possible to pay \$59 per cent or 60 per cent of the amount he owes to each creditor and then receive a discharge of the balance by the court after the Wage Earner's

Plan is completed. The debtor pays enough to the court trustee over a threevear period to cover all his debts, court costs and attorney's fees. Most plans provide that interest be cut off as of the date the petition is filed in court; and a debtor may save enough



It is a vaulted structure covered with marble, semi-precious stones, mosaics, and Florentine agate, all blended together in extravagant luxury.

The masterpiece of beauty, however, is the second structure -the "New Sacristy". This building was designed by Michelangelo, and the simplicity of lines and adornment look almost austere in comparison with the other buildings. It is said that in Aramathea. this building Michelangelo strove in man with purity and beauty rather than the temperal power reflected in the elaborate Mausoleum. Here, we saw our first works of Michelangelo: his interpretations of Dawn and Dusk on one side of the room facing Night and Day on the other side of the room also an unfinished Madonna and Child. There are two empty niches in the room which were to have been occupied by figures representing Heaven, Earth, and other forces of the uniher forces of the universe. These in 1534 Michelangelo fled the tyranny of Alessandro de Medici and took refuge in Rome. 

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
