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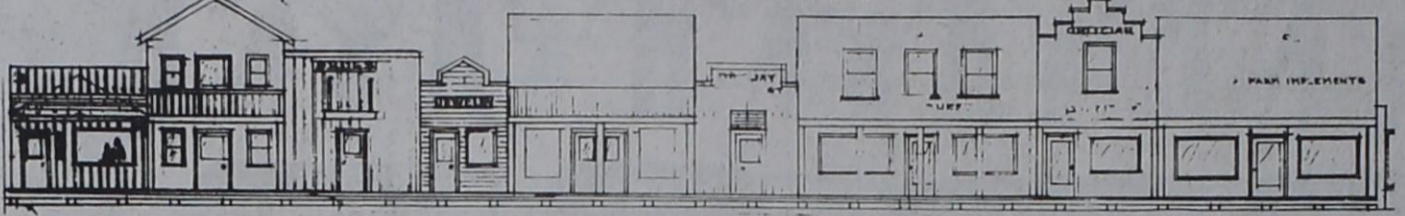

It is designed to answer questions from dairy and beef producers in all 254 Texas counties about the beef check off program.

"Texas cattle producers are asking the Texas Beef Council (TBC) and other agricultural organizations what the beef check off is doing for them in these trying times of low cattle prices, drought and high feed costs," says Bob Nunley of Sabinal, TBC chairman. "Thanks to satellite technology, we can bring the answers to the producers."

The Town Hall Meeting is a forum that will allow producers to ask questions about the direction of the check-off program or any of its activities. Answering will be leaders of the National Cattleman's Beef Association, Cattleman's Beef Board, US Meat Export Federation and Texas Beef Council. Beef producers can ask questions via a toll-free 800 number or transmit them by fax.

"The beef checkoff program is 10 years old," says Terry Stokes, TBC executive vice president. "The programs it has funded have maintained demand for beef in this country and have built sales for US beef around the world. But as with anything that's been in operation for a decade, it's time for everyone to become reacquainted with the goals and purposes of the program. We hope many Texas producers take the opportunity to do this through the Satellite Town Hall Meeting."

All beef producers can participate in the program at their Texas Farm Bureau County Office. The show will be broadcast on the Ku band. Call your local county office for seating availability. Home satellite owners can participate from their office or living room on the C-band.

Baird-A Snyder woman was injured in a two vehicle accident just west of Baird on I-20 during a rain storm about 1:30 Wednesday afternoon, July 3rd.

Jennifer Pool, 22, of Snyder and her husband, Charles, 27, were passengers in an east bound 1991 Ford Fiesta driven by John Rogers, Jr., 25, also of Snyder.

D.P.S. Trooper Stan Waters said Rogers apparently did not see the east bound Gandy's Milk Delivery Truck in time, due to rain, and rear-ended the truck sending the Fiesta off the road striking an embankment.

Mrs. Pool, who is six months pregnant, suffered injuries to her head and left knee during the accident and

was transported to Hendrick hospital by Citizens E.M.S., along with Rogers.

Charles Pool and the Gandy's driver, Randall Wheeler, 42, required no medical attention. A Hendrick spokeswoman said that Rogers and Mrs. Pool were treated and released from Hendrick Emergency Room.

Library News-Baird

The crafts of our pioneers will be lost unless we keep them alive. If you would like to revive a craft of the past, why not check with the library, the FOXFIRE books are a good starting place!

Hog dressing, log cabin building, hide tanning, butter churns, cornshuck doll making and weaving are just a few things covered in the FOXFIRE books.

FOXFIRE 9 is the latest of these books at the library. In this book, the topics covered are general stores, the Jud Nelson wagon, a praying rock, a Catawban Indian potter-- and haint tales, quilting, home cures, and the log cabin revisited. Even if you do not want to do any of these things-- just enjoy reading about these crafts or just reminisce about the past.

Last week we learned a little about the wheat and oat harvest around Baird in the year of 1888; this week we will learn a little about the cotton harvest of that year.

The following comes from the localities in The Baird Star September 27, 1888.

"Prof. Haynes says he will add \$2.50 to the Star's subscription for the school house bell. How many more will duplicate the subscription? We are informed that a good bell can be had for about \$30. We certainly can raise that amount.

The Presbyterians will need a bell for their church and if we could order both at once, we might get them cheaper. Let us have the bells.

Baird still leads all the towns in the West as a cotton market. Paste this in your hat for future reference.

Cotton has begun to come in pretty freely. Town property is going to advance. Some sales are reported, and many inquiries for

resident property in the last few days.

Maj. Richard's is busy getting the county exhibits ready for the Abilene and Dallas fairs. If you have any specimens of fine vegetables, grain cotton, timber, ores of any kind, bring them in right away.

The net increase in taxable vanes in the county for 1888 over 1887 is \$23,266. This is good, considering the extremely hard times caused by a two-year drought.

Three machines, owned by Foy, Mathews, and Yost threshed over 100,000 bushels of grain up to date.

The Baird Public School under Prof. Haynes and Misses McManis and Kershaw is still increasing in numbers. There are now 170 pupils enrolled and new ones coming in every week.

There are now fewer vacant dwelling houses in Baird than at any time since the town was founded.

Mr. J.K. Day has several hands at work on the mill and it will be ready in a few days to grind corn.

Next week we will learn about the cotton market in Baird. It is hard to believe Baird was ever a market place for cotton.

I hope you will come by and visit us at the library and look around the museum.

Two Aspermont Teachers Receive Grant To Teach Students About Solar Energy

Nancy Sparks and William Kuhn, educators at Aspermont High School, were awarded a grant from General Telephone Electronics (GTE) that will enable their eighth and ninth grade students to learn about alternative energy sources by constructing a solar pond.

Under the guidance of their teachers, the students will construct and maintain a solar pond, which provides heat energy by absorbing and retaining energy from the sun. The energy from the pond will be used to distill water and heat a greenhouse.

GTE hopes the project

will give students a better appreciation of the relationship between math and science and stimulate their interest in pursuing careers in these fields.

Sparks is a mathematics teacher and joined the Aspermont School System in 1994. Kuhn is a microbiologist and has been teaching science in Aspermont since 1992.

The U.S. needs to be doing all it can to develop alternative energy sources, and I would like to commend these educators for their abilities and for the challenges they are making possible for their students.

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
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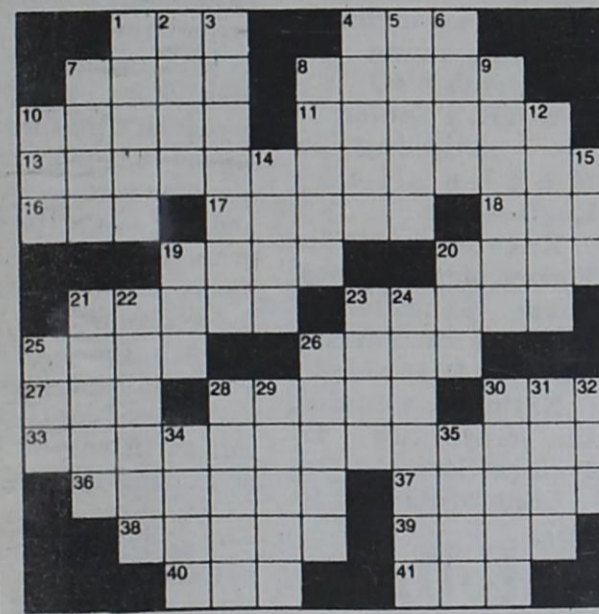

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales said last week no college or university in Texas should consider race as a factor in admitting students, granting scholarships or giving financial aid.

Morales issued the statement after the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear a reverse-discrimination case against the University of Texas (Hopwood v. UT Law School) that had been heard in the spring by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans. The court's ruling applies only to Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

Commenting on the issue, UT President Robert Berdahl told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "If anybody believes we can sustain the number (of minorities) without taking race into account, I think they are naive. We can't. And I think that's a loss for the university and a loss for the state."

Berdahl predicted the university will lose "an awful lot of the top minority talent from Texas, who will go out of state" where affirmative action practices continue and minority scholarships will be available.

Clinton Authorizes Drought Aid

President Clinton last week authorized the U.S. Department of Agriculture to sell up to 15 million bushels of grain from reserves in order to make drought disaster assistance payments to farmers in

drought-stricken West Texas and parts of the Southwest.

Though Texans had sought the release of the entire 45 million bushels of feed grain in the emergency reserve, U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison said she was satisfied with the authorization.

"Relief is on the way for Texas farmers and ranchers who have been hit hard by the drought. This will provide direct assistance for those most affected by drought conditions," she said.

The drought has cost Texas farmers and ranchers an estimated \$2.4 billion, making it the second worst natural disaster to hit the state this century, the Associated Press reported.

Report: Dissolve School Boards

A new report by the non-profit research organization, Education Commission for the States, suggests that states dissolve school boards, requiring new elections and sending tax money directly to schools.

The report, "Bending Without Breaking," says that for education to radically improve, the system governing schools must radically change.

Gov. George W. Bush signed the report's foreword but does not necessarily endorse it. Last week, at an Education Commission for the States conference in San Antonio, Bush told reporters he had not read the report, but said he endorsed only the parts of the report that agree with the changes in Texas, such as the establishment charter schools and less power in central education agencies.

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses, who also attended the conference, said that sending tax money directly to the schools could cause as many problems as it cures, the *Dallas Morning News* reported.

Moses said that if schools were granted such autonomy, there are questions about who would sit on the committees controlling the money and who would hold them accountable.

"Are we going to open up 6,300 new bureaucracies?" Moses asked, and suggested that it might cost schools more if they were to individually negotiate contracts for services, such as food service, bus transportation and copy machine repairs.

Rail Merger Plan Draws Fire

Texas officials and others last week urged the Federal Surface Transportation Board to reject a plan merging the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads.

"It's going to hurt Texas. It's going to hurt our ability to compete," Texas Railroad Commissioner Barry Williamson told the three-member board.

"In Texas, this railroad (merger) is about as welcome as the drought we're experiencing," U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, said.

Union Pacific and Southern Pacific own nearly all of the rail lines from Interstate 35, east.

But the Texas Railroad Commission and other Texas officials would be content if the board approves the merger on the condition that Union Pacific and Southern Pacific sell some of their parallel lines to competing railroad companies, such as Consolidated Rail Corp., the *Austin American-Statesman* reported.

Texas, Mexico to Fight TB

Because U.S. and Mexican communities along the Rio Grande have unusually high rates of tuberculosis, Texas authorities and their counterparts from the Mexican state of Coahuila are taking action.

Texas Commissioner of Health Dr. David Smith and officials from Saltillo, Mexico signed an agreement last week to fight the spread of the disease.

Officials from both states will coordinate and share information on TB cases and contacts, work together to diagnose and place TB patients in treatment and increase access to needed prescription drugs.

"As my border colleagues and I know all too well, disease respects no borders," Smith said.

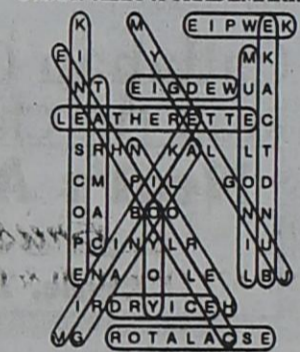

DENTURES - HANDLE WITH CARE

When is the most dangerous time in the life of dentures (sometimes called false teeth - but not by dentists)? The most dangerous period is when your dentures are out of your mouth!

Dentures should be handled carefully when they're out of your mouth. Dropping them even a few inches into a washbowl can break them. Hold your dentures over a towel or a basin half-filled with water. Then, should they slip from your hand, there will be a cushion to help prevent damage.

When dentures are out of your mouth for any length of time, they should be placed in water or a cleansing solution. If they become dry, they can warp.

Dentures should NEVER be placed in hot water. Hot water can warp the plastic.

If your denture does break, do not try to put it together yourself. Solvents found in some glues can damage denture plastics and irritate your mouth. If is almost impossible to precisely align broken parts. If you try, the denture will fit poorly and be useless or, even worse, harmful. Go directly to your dentist for repair.

Heat Is Major Summer Killer

Heat is a major summer killer. Each year it takes a greater toll in lives than the more spectacular weather events such as hurricanes, floods or tornadoes. Texas's Division of Emergency Management and your local office of emergency management encourage citizens to protect themselves and their loved ones from the health related hazards of hot weather. The following may help you educate your audience about these hazards and the measures that can help reduce health risks.

•As a rule of thumb, when the temperatures rise, slow down. Heed your body's early warnings.

Reduce activity and stay in a cool, shady or air conditioned place as much as possible during the hottest part of the day. Heatstroke often develops swiftly, with little warning. More than half of heatstroke victims become ill less than 24 hours before being hospitalized

or found dead.

•Beware of high humidity. Perspiration is the body's natural cooling mechanism. When humidity is low, this evaporation "cools" the skin. Air movement, such as a breeze or fan, evaporates perspiration and cools the body. When the humidity is high, this evaporative cooling process is lost, and the danger of heat related illness increases.

•Do not dry out. Drink plenty of water often and regularly. Do not wait until you are thirsty. Avoid caffeine and alcohol. Eat small meals and eat more often. Avoid foods that are high in protein, which increase metabolic heat.

•Dress for hot weather. Wear lightweight, light colored and loose fitting clothing to help maintain normal body temperature. When outdoors wear sunglasses and a wide brimmed hat, a cap with meshed crown, or carry a parasol. Avoid sunburn,

and use a sun screen agent.

•Get out of the heat for at least a few hours each day. If air conditioning is not available, go to an air conditioned environment such as a shopping mall, public library or museum. If this is not possible, find a well-ventilated, shady area.

•Check on the elderly, sick or very young, they are most affected by hot,

humid weather. Take extra precautions for them while the hot spell lasts.

•Do not forget pets, they are subject to the same dangers posed by hot weather as are humans. Make sure pets have a cool, shady place in which to rest during the heat of the day, well ventilated, with a supply of fresh, cool water.

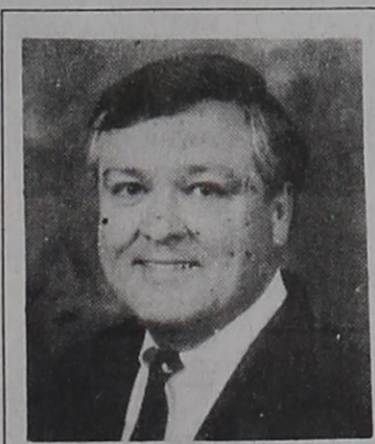
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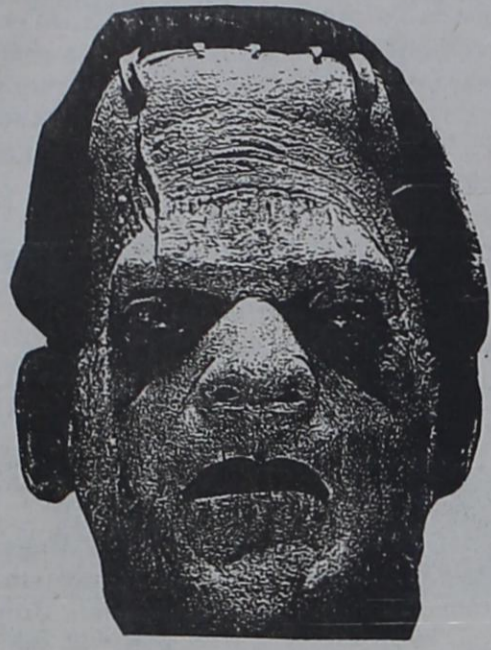

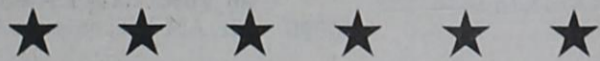

News From John Sharp

State Comptroller John Sharp commended a decision by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to release emergency feed grains to farmers and ranchers in 24 far West Texas counties that were dropped from the federal Emergency Livestock Feed Program at the end of May.

"The hardworking folks who put food on our tables deserve the full range of available assistance to see them through these trying times," Sharp said.

Sharp's office was notified of the decision in late June, after Sharp reiterated his request for aid in a letter to Agriculture Secretary Glickman.

In April, Congress voted to end the federal Emergency Livestock Feed Program at the end of May. Due to the continuing drought conditions in Texas, USDA extended the program through August 31. However, Sharp said, rules and regulations prevented 24 West

KOREAN WAR MARINES-- A letter has been received from Ann Hammers, Assistant Head of the U.S. Marine Corps Casualty Section. Her office "unaccounted for" Marines. Her office has family members in this category from Korea, the Cold War and Vietnam. That service is trying to update their database for the families of these Marines from the Korean War. If you know of anyone who is a family member of one of these Marines, please ask them to call Ms. Hammers at 800-847-1597.

Q & A--Question: Our family depends on my husband's service-connected disability compensation to live one, but he is facing criminal charges. Will we lose that income if he is convicted?

Answer: If the Veteran's incarceration in a federal, state or local penal institution is for 60 days or less, or if the crime was not a felony, there is no effect on V A compensation. However, if incarceration for a felony extends beyond 60 days, Veterans service connected at 20 percent or greater are reduced to the 10 percent rate, while Veterans rated at less than 20 percent receive half their normal compensation rate. KOREAN WAR MEMORIAL-- The July 8 edition of THE DALLAS MORNING NEWS carries an article on the editorial page regarding the possibility of a Korean War Memorial being erected on the grounds of our State Capitol. Thanks to the efforts of the Lone Star Chapter of the Korean War Veterans Association, a Texas memorial was approved last year by the Texas Legislature and the Texas Board of Preservation.

The memorial will be dedicated to the 286,000 Texas service-people who served in Korea. It will bear the names of the 1,719 Texans killed in action or still listed as missing. A site on the northwest corner of the Capitol grounds has been designated. But, \$230,000 still must be raised from private donations before the project can get under way. As the 43rd anniversary of the end of the Korean War and first anniversary of the national memorial approaches, it would be fitting that Texas people do their part to make this long overdue memorial a reality by contributing to the memorial fund. The article did not have an address for donations, so this will be supplied in a later column.

Sharp said that USDA will make available 15 million bushels of grain from the Disaster Reserve within the next 10 days. Open market sales of stocks will be conducted on a competitive basis, and proceeds from the sales will go to help farmers and ranchers who lack sufficient feed to maintain their livestock.

Sharp also reiterated specific steps proposed in his earlier drought and beef cattle reports that the state can take to minded the state's Legislative Budget Board that it should consider additional funding for the Small Community Loan Program administered by the Texas Water Development Board.

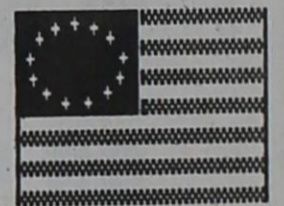

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Mosquitoes And Ticks Remain A Problem

Due to recent rains and warm weather, the mosquito and tick problems are continuing to cause various diseases and illnesses through the Callahan County area. An infestation of ticks can cause great discomfort to a dog, contribute to generalized skin problems, create anemia, leading to the death of the dog and pose a serious threat by transmitting diseases from infected to non-infected dogs. Also, a severe mosquito problem greatly increases the chance a dog will become infected with heart worms.

Tick-borne diseases have been diagnosed with increasing frequency in the last few years. With the spread of these diseases into new areas, including the infection of humans, the frequency of their diagnosis is expected to continue to increase. Suspicious dogs (note from Editor: I don't think they mean dogs will come to you and say, "Hey, owner, I'm just a little bit suspicious of "dog-so-n-so"...") should be tested so that infected dogs can be treated to eliminate the reservoir of the disease and prevent its spread to other dogs.

Even though we are seeing these new tick-borne problems, the most common complication in our area is severe infestation resulting in anemia and occasionally death. If dogs become infested with ticks, they should be dipped, sprayed or

powdered as frequently as recommended to kill the ticks. If dogs have access only to a limited area, a tick eradication program should be followed in that area to eliminate ticks that may be harboring the disease organisms.

Due to EPA regulations, many of the residue producing solutions have been taken off the market so the treatment of the animal or premises may be necessary. All label instructions on any dip, spray or powder should be strictly followed for safety and effectiveness.

Mosquitoes are key carriers of heart worm disease. When an infected dog is bitten by a mosquito, blood is carried away which may include tiny, immature forms of heartworms called microfilariae. It takes about three months for these larvae to travel through the tissues of the body to enter the heart.

Dozens of these larvae (some of which can actually become up to 14 inches long) become adults within another three months. There have been 9 confirmed cases of Heartworms diagnosed at the Callahan County Veterinary Clinic since January. This is a large number for a rural area like Callahan County.

Thanks to research and modern preventative medicine, there is a lot you can do to avoid heartworms in the first place-or see that it is

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successfully treated if it hasn't progressed too far.

*A blood test is the only way to detect heartworm disease in its early stages.

*Since it's possible for an infected dog to have adult heartworms without microfilariae, an X-ray examination and other lab tests may be needed to confirm heartworm infection.

*After the disease has progressed, symptoms can include frequent coughing, sluggishness, (won't want to wash the dishes), rapid tiring and finally, labored breathing.

*If caught in time, a series of injections of an organic arsenical drug can be used to kill heartworms. Then another drug can be used to get rid of the microfilariae.

*No vaccine is available for heartworm disease, but we can give regular doses of a drug which can prevent infective lar-

vae from developing into adult worms.

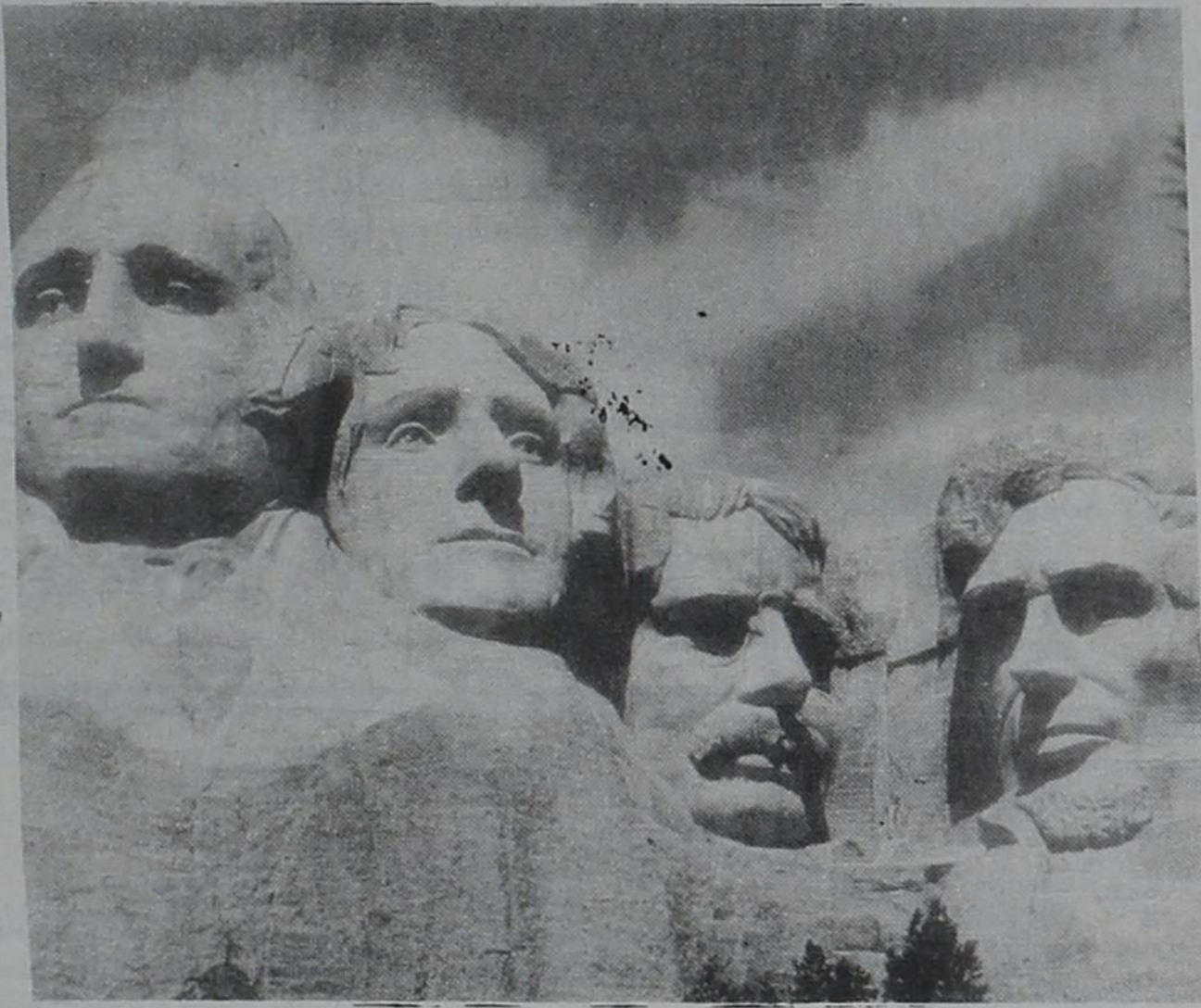
A little preventative medicine is much better than treating the problem. If the warm, wet weather continues, these parasites may be a threat for several months.

So the Editor's advice is to get a pet peeve instead of a pet dog.
