FROM FARMER TO CONSUMER

Wisconsin Legislator in Proposed Bill Would Allow Persons to Deal Direct With Countryman.

Madison, Wis., Feb. 11.—An attack on the high cost of living was begun in the houses yesterday when Speaker Hull, aiming to bring together farmers and consumers, introduced a bill providing that the state industrial commission shall offer to publish names of individuals who desire to purchase direct from farmers, cheese factories and country dealers.

Both farmer and consumer would benefit under the proposed law, according to Hull, who presented statistics to show that the farmer gets only 46 per cent of the price for his produce, railroad and retailer getting the other 54 per cent.

"It means the parcel post, farmers and country dealers will be able to sell their product direct to the consumers at a much higher price and the consumer will purchase it at a much lower price than under present conditions in large cities," said Speaker Hull.

FARMING IS TAUGHT THERE

Santo Domingo Establishes School and an Experiment Station.

Washington, Feb. 11.—Agriculture is being taught in Santo Domingo in a school established for that purpose.

A special commission was created by executive decree in Santo Domingo under the direction of a French cacao expert.

The principal advancement in agriculture during 1912 was the establishment of a new sugar estate at La Romana in the Matanzas district.

Dean Curtis Brings Favorable Word From Washington.

"In a conference with the department of agriculture," said Dean Curtis, "it was told that the government would probably be in a position to extend aid in Iowa as rapidly as the counties are organized and ready to ask it."

Dean Curtis heard the closing senate debate on the Page bill which passed that body last week.

"It is quite certain that this congress will pass some measure giving larger aid to the land grant colleges for extension work, not only for agriculture and home economics, but for industrial or trades extension as well," he said.

Dean Curtis saw Secretary James Wilson in Washington. He is in health and expects to be back in Iowa by the middle of March for his reception at the college.
