ADVANCING AGRICULTURAL KNOWLEDGE. On March 23rd, The Denver & Rio Grande railroad in connection with the Colorado Agricultural College will start a special agricultural demonstration train over its line on a nine days tour of the principal farming and stock raising sections of the Upper Arkansas, Eagle, Roaring Fork, Grand, Cimarron, North Fork and San Luis valleys in Colorado.

MORE MONEY FOR SCHOOL. Increased Appropriations for Manhattan and Other Institutions. Topeka, Feb. 21.—The senate ways and means committee has completed its recommendations of appropriations for the three big educational institutions of the state.

PAY OF COUNTRY TEACHERS. In the annual report of the Winnebago county schools it is shown that the pay of teachers in the country schools of the county ranges from \$32 to \$59 a month, the average being less than \$45.

SWAT THE COCKROACH NOW

Swedish Pathologist Says They Lay Eggs That Cause Cancer.

Berlin, Feb. 24.—The results of experiments to determine the origin of cancer were published recently by Professor Johannes Fibiger, director of the Pathological Institute at Copenhagen.

His researches show that cancerous growths in the esophagus and stomach of rodents were due to the presence in the alimentary tract of minute worms, an indeterminate number of which are from the common kitchen cockroach.

The experiments are considered of great importance to seekers for a cure of cancer, as they form the first experimental production of the disease.
