These are mostly tobacco. warehouses, or belong to tobacco magnates, for this weed must at least be given the credit for the present prosperity of this rising town, which is the great tobacco port and manufacturing center of Macedonia. The chief ruins, which date back to

Paul's time, are the remains of a huge Roman aqueduct, whose magnificent arches until two years before my visit had brought water to the modern city.
