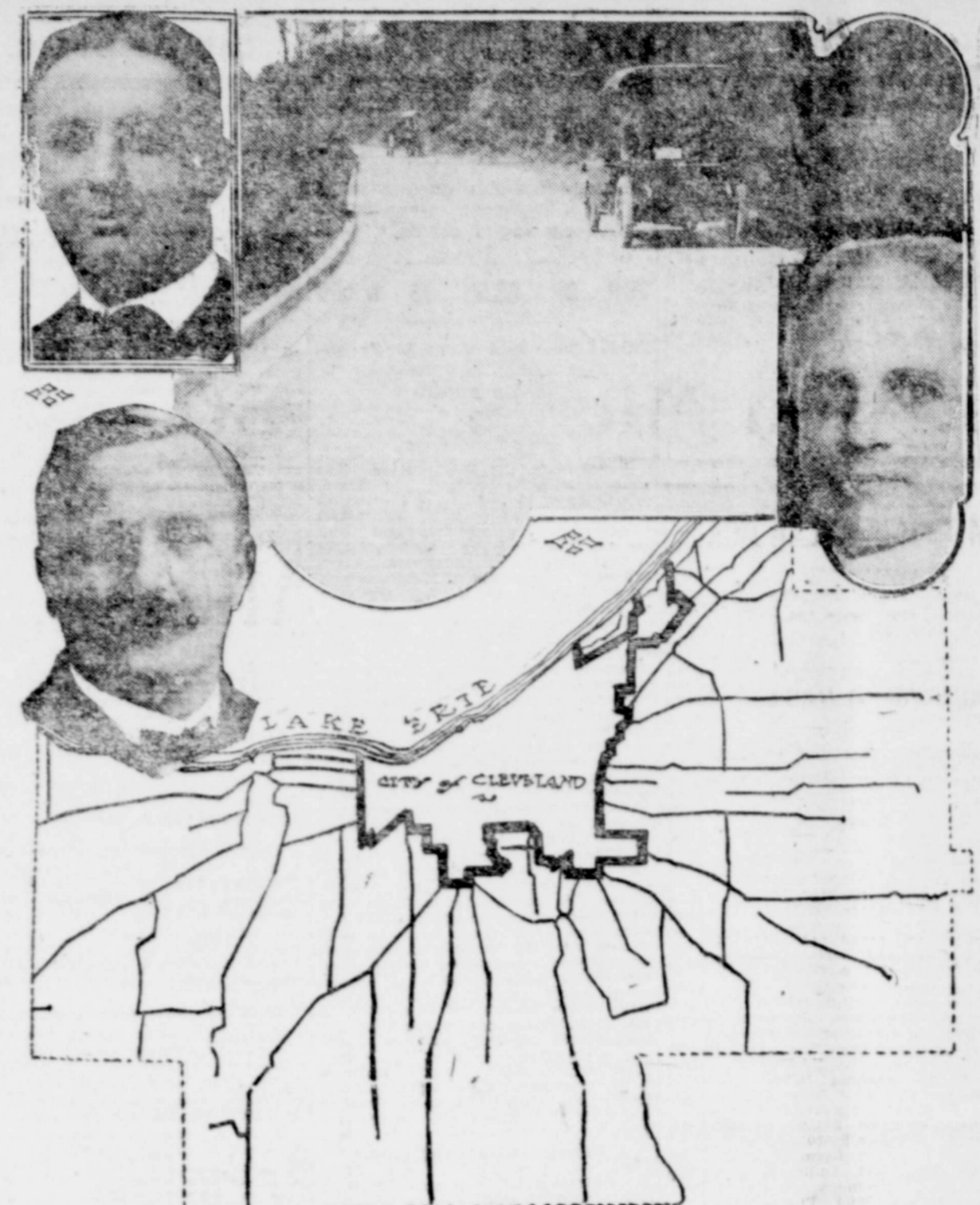

Commissioners Erick, Vail and Fisher; the kind of Road They Built. Map Shows Wonderful Network. Four hundred miles of rural brick highway have been laid in Cuyahoga county, surrounding Cleveland, Ohio, during the last ten years.

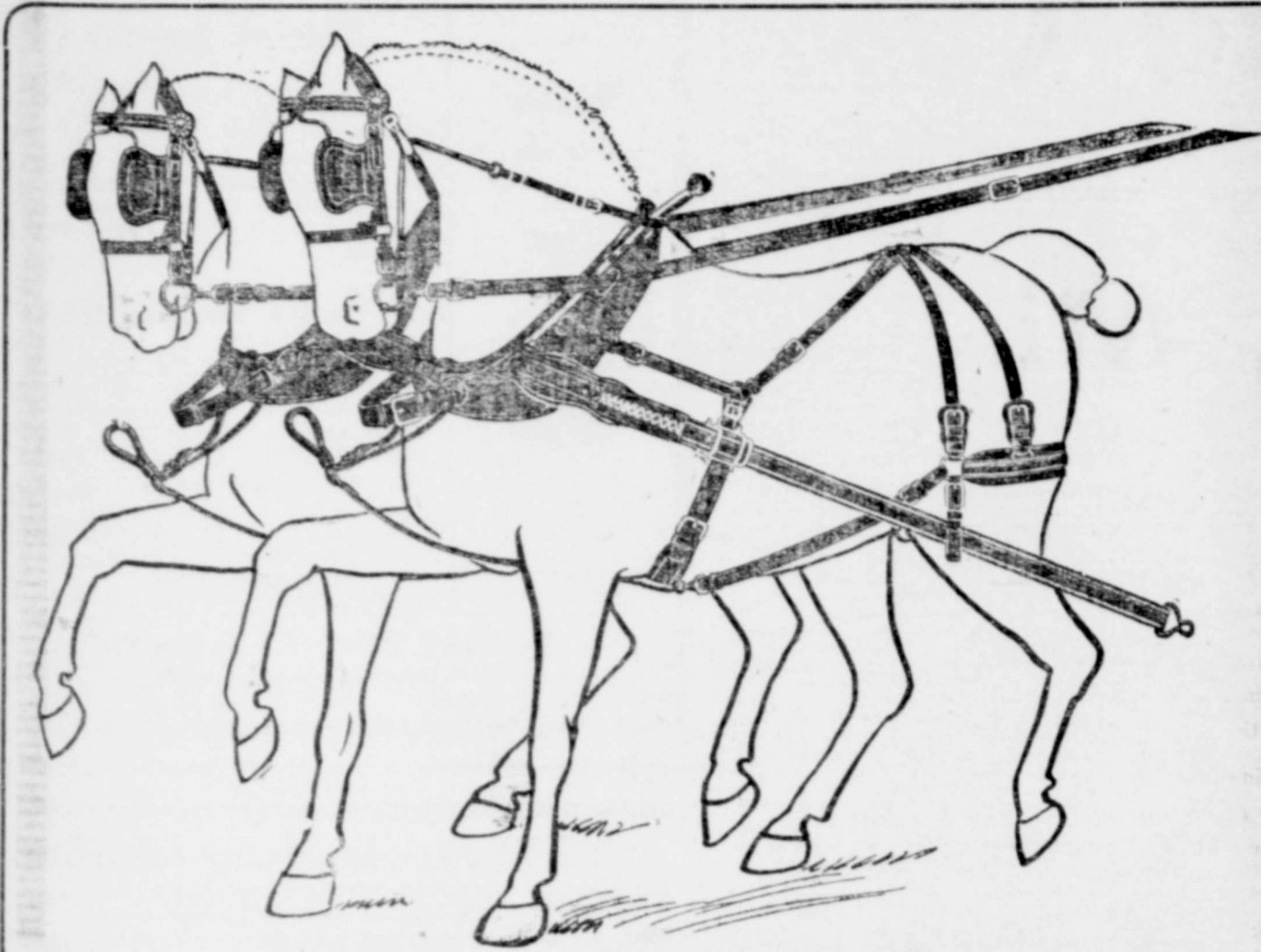

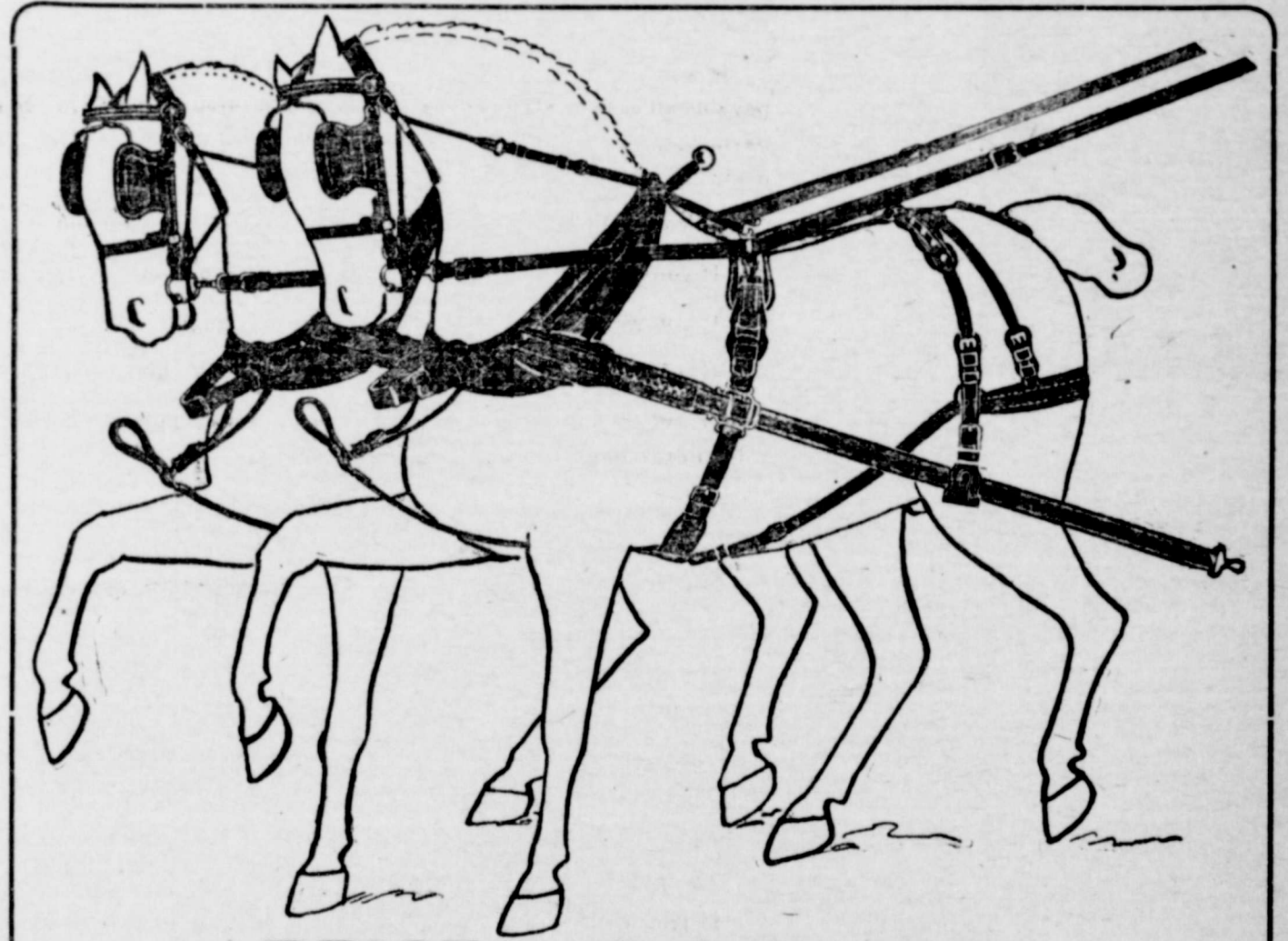

THE USE OF COTTONSEED OIL.

Said to Be Purer Than Olive Oil and Much Cheaper.

Most housewives, whose families have the salad habits, know what a considerable item olive oil is to their outlay for food. And a good many look longingly at the bottle of oil, for which they have paid at the rate of a dollar or more per quart, and think how they would like to use it for cooking purposes if it were not so expensive.

If they would put aside their prejudices and give cottonseed oil a trial, they would find it good for both kitchen and table purposes, while it costs only about one-third as much.

In an address before the Interstate Cottonseed Crushers' association, in New York, in June, 1911, Dr. Harvey M. Wiley, formerly chief of the bureau of chemistry, said: "I have been al-

ways an advocate of the use of cottonseed oil as a human food. I do not believe there is a man, woman or child in this country, but would have better health and be a better judge of what is good to eat, and be happier by reason of his better health than he is today, if the consumption of cottonseed oil were common throughout this broad land."

He did not mean that there is any virtue in cotton seed oil above other oils, but only that we need to eat more oil, and that the cottonseed variety is more generally accessible because it is cheaper. "The people of this country," he said, "are not, as a rule, very great eaters of oil—not as great as they should be. * * * The health of the people will be better if they eat more oil."

Dr. James J. Walsh of New York City says that the digestion of vegetable oils requires less digestive energy than animal fats, and he considers the former preferable for food be-

cause of their certain purity. For the consumer can rarely be quite sure that the lard or tallow has come from animals entirely free from disease. "The vegetable or plant oils," he goes on, "are entirely free from this objection. The modern carefully refined, pure cottonseed oil, absolutely neutral, without free fatty acid of any kind to disturb the digestion or the presence of any foreign substance to hinder the assimilative process in the human economy, is as desirable an addition to the human diet as it is possible to imagine."

With everything in its favor as a cheap, wholesome and valuable food supply, it is curious that there should be such a widespread prejudice against cottonseed oil. Doubtless it comes from the fact that for a long time most people know of it chiefly as an adulterant of olive. The general but mistaken opinion being that anything used as an adulterant must be injurious, cottonseed oil was forced at

the very start to take the part of the villain in the drama. One of the reasons why olive oil has risen in price during recent years is because when it is imported into this country it cannot be labeled olive oil unless it is olive oil. It cannot now be made in part of the cheaper oil. In former years we ate a great deal of cottonseed oil for which we paid olive prices and did not know the difference. It takes a very fastidious taste indeed to distinguish between them and unless the olive oil is of the very best quality the cottonseed oil may have the finer flavor. For it is likely to be the purer product because it is necessary to refine it more.

The manufacturers themselves are largely to blame for the difficulty cottonseed oil is having in reforming its reputation. At the convention, above referred to, Doctor Wiley gave them good advice when he adjured them to let it stand on its own merits. "The way to sell cottonseed oil," he told

them, "is to sell it as cottonseed oil. Do not try to pass it off on the market as 'salad oil' or an oil under any fancy name, but get the people to recognize it by its own name; teach them to have confidence in it and to know it by its virtues and values."

TINY EXPERIMENT FARMS.

Baltimore County One of the First to Adopt New Scheme.

Collier's Weekly: Here is a suggestion for school children, especially for country school children and their teachers. Some of the youthful farmers who have made two ears of corn grow where none grew before ought to be particularly interested in it. It comes from Mr. Richard Haughton, who tells in *The Rural New Yorker* of some experiments he and his brother have made on their farm in Chester county, Pennsylvania, to find

the best method of preparing soil for sowing alfalfa. The experiment is the same as that suggested by Prof. Milton Whitney in Circular 18, bureau of soils, United States department of agriculture.

It consists of testing, by planting seed in pots, the actual soil of the farm under various conditions of fertilization. The disadvantages of the usual scheme of devoting several plots of the farm itself to the crop under test is that it is comparatively expensive, and that at least a season is used in arriving at the result. "The advantage of the pot experiment is that it is cheap and may be carried on in winter indoors. Especially constructed wire pots are used, different soils put in each and the result is known in a few weeks. There is a photograph of eighteen of these pots accompanying Mr. Haughton's article. To some ground limestone had been added; to others bone, bone and potash, nitro-culture, etc. These that

were inoculated produced plants very much larger than the soils without inoculation. The actual results on the farm seemed to justify the pot experiments.

The agricultural high school at Sparks, Baltimore county, Md., has tried this system of experiment under the guidance of Professor Crocherson, and it has also been tried with success in Troyden and Easttown townships, Chester county, Pa. Mr. Haughton's article is in *The Rural New Yorker* for Nov. 8. The instructions for carrying out the experiment may be found in the agricultural department bulletin already mentioned.
