IN WOMAN'S REALM

QUILT IS 16-YEAR TASK.

New Mexico Woman Finishing Rare Piece of Work.

Almogordo, N. M., March 25.—Mrs. H. C. Lane of Almogordo, is putting the finishing touches on an embroidered bed quilt that has been in the making process for more than 16 years.

The background is of red velvet and on it are arranged 56 blocks, 11x14 inches. Each block contains a life design of scenery. There are two crossed flags, shield and eagle, George Washington, President Taft, former President Diaz of Mexico, scenes in Europe and 12 "Fables" being bronchos, Paul Revere on his ride, school of fish devouring a frog, Dan Patch from real life, two hunters and their pointer, a cat catching birds, flying birds and butterflies.

Simple Fire Extinguisher.—A siphon of soda is an excellent fire-extinguisher, as the carbonic-acid gas in the soda water helps to stifle the flames. The siphon can be filled, and the liquid will carry to a considerable height, such as the top of a blazing curtain, etc.

Salt in Cocoa.—When making a cup of cocoa put into it (when mixed) a pinch of salt, and you will find a great improvement in the flavor. This also takes the watery taste away.

Quick Bleaching.—Handkerchiefs and white clothes that have become yellow from use of too much soap or any other cause, may be whitened in the following manner: After washing let them soak overnight in a tub of clear water, to which is added a teaspoonful of cream of tartar. When ironed they will be white as snow.

Softening Mackintoshes.—Mackintosh coats which have become hard and rigid may be easily cleaned with lime and water and made to look as good as new. A handful of the best gray lime dissolved in half a bucket of water, applied with a small sponge, makes it better. Repeat after three hours.

Purifying the Air.—The air of a room may be purified in two hours by setting inside of it a wide-mouthed pitcher with pure and very cold water. By that time it will have absorbed all the gases in the room.

Cooking Vegetables.—When cooking vegetables remember that all vegetables which grow above ground should be put into boiling water, and all which grow underground in cold water—with the exception of new potatoes.

WAR ON AUTOMOBILES. Chicago Mayor Says 95 Per Cent of Drivers Are Lawless.

Chicago, March 25.—Mayor Harrison declared war against automobiles here today declaring that 95 per cent of drivers were lawless. The mayor declared the boulevard in front of his house is a racecourse for law defying chauffeurs.

The first gun he will fire will be an ordinance forbidding chauffeurs to sound warning signals in the busy part of the city. The mayor wants motor cars reduced to the same footing as other vehicles. The drivers of teams warn pedestrians," he said today, "chauffeurs think all they have to do is sound their horns and pedestrians can jump out of the way. Let them drive with care and remember that the pedestrians' right is supreme. The only way to force them to do this is by taking away their privilege of tooting horns and making people jump."

119 CASKS OF APPLE SEEDS. Kansas City, Mo., March 25.—One apple seed, said an expert in the Hyde trial, contains one-thirty-fifth thousandths of 1 per cent of cyanide. According to that measurement, the shipment of 119 casks of apple seeds, passed through the customs house, in Kansas City is hardly dangerous.

The seeds were shipped from Southern France for distribution in Kansas City to southwestern fruit growers.

EATS 20 EGGS IN HALF HOUR. Tocona, Wash., March 25.—M. K. Maxwell of Auburn bet Richard Martin of Seattle that he could eat fifty eggs within one hour.

Mrs. Daveport, with whom Maxwell boards, boiled fresh eggs one minute. Maxwell ate them at the rate of five a minute until they had disappeared. He took twelve minutes recess and then disposed of the remaining twenty.

VALUE OF LEAF MOULD.

It is the Most Valuable Manure on Heavy Soils.

This term is applied to leaves when they are so thoroughly decayed as to readily separate into small particles. Leaf mould is a valuable manure in many instances, especially on heavy soils, and one of the most important ingredients for the soil used in the successful cultivation of the majority of plants.

It may be used freely, particularly with the tender seedlings and cuttings of soft wooded subjects, provided it be of good quality and free from injurious fungoid growths. The production of roots in young plants of this description is induced and accelerated with more certainty by planting in this material than by the use of any other.

INDIANS TENT ON ROOF.

Redskins Objected to Confinement in Hotel Rooms.

New York, March 25.—An Indian camp has been established on the roof of one of the city's most fashionable hotels. Chief Three Bears, who is 30 years old, protested against the confining four walls of a room. So he and Long Time Sheep, White Wolf, Lazy Boy, Big Top, Medicine Owl, White Wolf's squaw, and Medicine Owl's squaw, and a 19-year-old Indian girl all pitched their tepees above the eaves, whence they could look out over the city's artificial peaks and canyons. The Indians are the guests of Louis Hill, chairman of the Great Northern railroad directors. They are in the city as attaches to an industrial exhibit.

STATE FARM RECEIPTS.

Little Rock, Ark., March 25.—State Auditor J. M. Oathout, financial agent of the penitentiary, has made a report showing receipts of \$124,312 from the sale of state farm products during 1912. All of this was from cotton and cotton seed. The purchase of 25 horses and mules for the state farm has been authorized.

**DIED WORTH 70 MILLION.**  
Widow of E. H. Harriman Gives Out Inventory of Estate.  
New York, March 25.—An inventory of the estate of the late E. H. Harriman, furnished the state comptroller, shows that the estate, when he died in 1909 it was valued in the aggregate at \$70,000,000. The chief holdings of the financier were railroad, steamship and industrial securities and real estate.

Mr. Harriman held no bonds of the Union Pacific or the Southern Pacific railroads, but of the former he had 31,500 shares of preferred stock, appraised at \$5,271,650, and 55,000 of the common stock, valued at \$10,725,000. Of Southern Pacific stock, the financier held only 1,000 shares of the common. This at the time of his death was appraised at \$124,000. His Erie holdings were \$8,819,000.

The estate at present is valued at \$80,000,000. The report that Mr. Harriman, prior to his death, distributed \$50,000,000 of railroad stocks to members of his family are shown to be untrue.

**TO RUN STATE SCHOOLS.**  
Commission Plan Urged for Agricultural Institutions.  
Des Moines, Ia., March 25.—The commission plan of government for Iowa state agricultural institutions—this is the aim of the senate committee on agriculture, according to a report leaked out here. A bill is being formulated to create a state commission of agriculture with three commissioners, to receive a salary of \$3,750 and devote their entire time to the work. It is proposed that this commission shall have general control and supervision of the state fair, state food and dairy commissions, department of agriculture, forestry and horticulture and all other matters of an agricultural nature.

Senator Ames, who is taking a leading part in drafting the measure, declares its passage will mean an annual saving to the state of from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

**GLORY FOR SPORTS.**  
Piscatorial Prevarications Can Get Easier Action After This Year.  
Spokane, Wash., March 25.—After this year the fishing season in Washington will open April 1, instead of May 1, as in past years. The new game law, besides providing for game wardens in every county, gives the game commission power to set aside three townships in each county for the protection of birds and animals. Spokane sportsmen will endeavor to have Mount Spokane, the highest peak in eastern Washington, dedicated to this purpose.

**GIANT WOMAN IS DEAD.**  
Beatrice, Kan., March 25.—Miss Ida Lander, aged 72 years, believed to be the heaviest woman in Kansas, is dead at the home of her brother, following a short illness. She weighed 463 pounds. A special coffin was built for her.

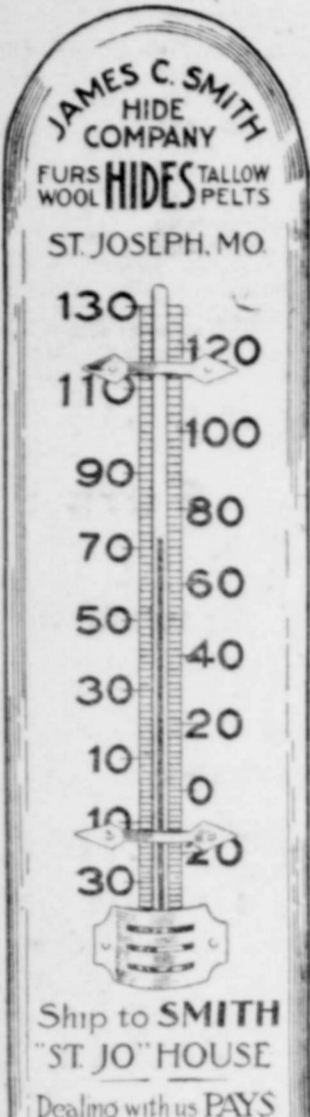

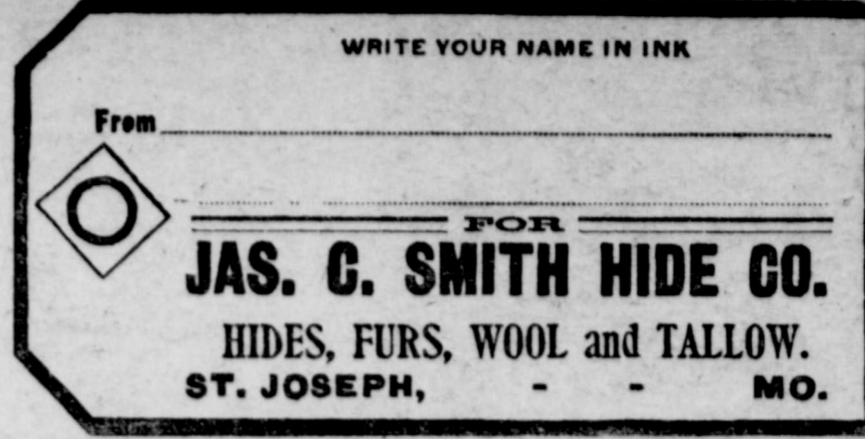

## OMAHA CITY OF RUIN

Continued from Page One. of the storm, from three to seven blocks in width, cut a swath twenty-four blocks long, first through an exclusive residence section of the city, then through a graduation of dwellings, until it expended itself of energy in the wrecking of a pool hall and moving picture show. The total of deaths in this part of the city reached almost to the half hundred mark. Within the space of this storm center, which if made rectangular, would cover a quarter section of land, 1200 houses are wrecked, one hundred dead bodies have been recovered, and workmen are still engaged in searching the ruins for bodies. Several are known to be still in the ruins at the end of the storm path. Estimates of the value of property demolished by the storm vary between \$5,000,000 and \$12,000,000. Some of the more substantial houses can be partially rebuilt, but this number is small, and where the buildings have not been torn asunder, they have been so twisted that even the material is useless for rebuilding. Today five public schools are out of commission in Omaha. Seven churches are partially or wholly wrecked. One private school for girls is a total wreck, although all the students escaped. The rest of the loss is to homes. The destruction began with the millionaire homes on the exclusive West Farnam and Bemis park district. Few lives were lost in this exclusive district, but farther northeast the buildings collapsed more easily and a large number of deaths resulted. 2,947 DEER HIS RECORD AT 90 New York State Hunter Has 47 Beams to Credit, Besides Lesser Game. Monticello, N. Y., Mar. 25.—With record of having shot 2,947 deer and forty-seven bears, John Horton is celebrating his ninetieth birthday at Beaver Kill, Sullivan county. Horton says that he has kept correct count of every deer and bear he has killed, but no record of wolves, wildcats, and foxes. His record would make even the chief Bull Moose sit up and take notice. He is as active as a man of half his years, which he attributes to having passed the most of his life in the forest. Horton was born on the banks of the Beaver Kill and from the time he was large enough to carry a gun kept the family larder supplied with game and fish.
