



Mr. Harriman held no bonds of the Union Pacific or the Southern Pacific railroads, but of the former he had 51,900 shares of preferred stock, ap-praised at \$5,371,650, and 55,000 of the common stock, valued at \$10,725,-000. Of Southern Pacific stock, the financier held inly 1,000 shares of the inancier held inly 1,000 shares of the common. This at the time of his deat was appraised at \$124,000. His Eric holdings were \$8,849,000.


