Not Less Than 200 Perished in Sunday Storm, Is Claim.

Omaha, Neb., March 25.—Yesterday for the first time since the disastrous tornado of Easter Sunday, the people of Omaha began to count the cost, both in lives and dollars.

The greatest work yesterday was that of organizing a systematic relief bureau with seven branch stations in the territory covered by the tornado.

City Commissioner Ryder stated that offers aggregating nearly a million dollars had been received, but declared Omaha business would be able to care for their own.

Local theaters have arranged to give benefit performances Saturday night and several out of town theatrical managers have telegraphed intention to do likewise.

Chicago, Ill., March 25.—In racing in the United States and Canada in the year 1905 the number of horses started was 6,232. Last year the number engaged in races was 5,925, says Daily Racing Form.

Had these mares alone been kept in this country and engaged in reproducing their kind it would have meant the birth of at least 4,000 foals in the course of the five years, of which from 2,500 to 3,000 would have made their appearance in racing and kept the number of those so engaged up to something approximating the average of the years when the sport was in its most prosperous state.

The importance of this loss in our thoroughbred resources can be better perceived when it is realized that in all the world there are perhaps not to exceed 75,000 thoroughbred horses.

Washington, March 26.—George E. Roberts, director of the mint predicts that the production of gold will not materially increase during the next 10 years.

It is not probable, says Director Roberts, that any harmful results will come from a slowing down in the rate of accumulation of gold, for, he added, it must be recognized that the growth of gold supplies during the last 20 years has been at an abnormally high rate.

The United States has been particularly successful in obtaining and holding a large share of the new gold of the last 12 years, the gains of the treasury and national from 1909 to 1912 aggregating \$325,795,999, an increase of more than 100 per cent.

Filed away among the Mormon records at Salt Lake City is the plan of the Far West that was to be a noble city with blocks 392 feet square, stretching away on either side of avenues 132 feet wide.
