Turkey Can Still Pay All Her Loans If Left Her Asiatic Empire.

Financiers are figuring out how bondholders will stand after the map of the Balkans is rearranged, remarks the New York World.

SHIPS THAT MADE HISTORY

Sentiment Calls for the Preservation of the Constitution and the Constellation.

A few historic ships of war still grace the navy list, and associated as they are with our most illustrious days afloat, it becomes not only a matter of sentiment but of duty to preserve their stout and battered hulls as inspirations to patriotism and as object lessons in our annals of the sea.

Each of these famous vessels has in its day made history for us. And the traditions clinging to their names and legends are still cherished among the priceless inheritances of the nation.

Two of these—the Constitution and the Constellation—were laid down nearly 120 years ago, and it may be urged without undue pride that the Constitution was the greatest frigate of its era; indeed, the most noble single ship that has ever flown our pennant.

BURIED WITH DUMB FRIEND

Peculiar Instructions Left by Englishman Concerning His Place of Interment.

Curious directions were left by James Griffith Dearden, F. S. A., with regard to his burial. Mr. Dearden, a Lancashire (Eng.) man, died last fall, aged seventy-three, and the gross value of his estate is more than \$2,500,000.

Among the instructions which he left were the following, written on a sheet of black-edged paper: "It is my will and wish that my remains be cremated and then interred at the same place where my dog Pompey is now buried."
