Union. That order will be enforced by the new fire marshal's office, established by the last legislature. The marshal is Harris Farkman of Emporia and he appointed as his chief deputy Charles Miller of Minneapolis.

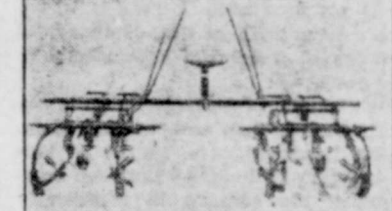

HAD FIRST WIRELESS

African Tribes Used Drums, Etc., to Convey Messages.

News of Important Events in Heart of Sudan Sent to Trading Posts on the Coast—Had Their Own Telegraph Code.

Paris.—The principle of telegraphy would appear to have been anticipated by the savage tribes in the heart of Africa. This barbaric system of communication, at once practical and effective, survives to this day, and its value has been tested many times.

French explorers seem to have been the first to bring this system to the knowledge of civilized people. By means of it news of important events in the interior of the Sudan reaches all the trading posts on the coast in a short time.

The communication is made by means of various instruments, the most common ones being horn, tom-toms and whistles. The horns are made of solid ivory, hollowed out of elephants' tusks. The mouthpiece is at the side. These trumpets are of various sizes, but the favorite ones are very long and give a low, muffled note, produced by plugging the mouthpiece with corks of different sizes.

The ordinary tom-tom is a hollow bit of wood, with a goatskin over one end. The following instance illustrates the manner in which the native telegraph is employed. The post commander at Stanley Falls was once informed by a native of a neighboring village that a provision train had been attacked two days before at a point 180 miles further down the Congo.

They had reached the scene of the alleged attack at the time reported, but the shots that the natives had taken as indications of a conflict with robbers had been fired at a herd of antelope.

At a later period, when an officer of the French Congo came to grief in the rapids, the accident was reported the next morning at a village 180 miles distant.

Among the Bengali tribe a sort of xylophone is used with four notes, by means of which the natives communicate over great distances in a kind of telegraphic language.

An American missionary working among the Basutos discovered that the villages had means of conveying messages from one chief to another or of transmitting the intelligence of defeat or victory.

The Basutos hollow out a large gourd and thoroughly dry it. Then kidskin as hard and as thin as parchment is stretched across the hollow of the gourd. When beaten with a padded drumstick this gives forth a sound that may be distinctly heard at a distance of from five to eight miles.

In every village here is a class of men who are utilized as scouts. Among these there are always some trained to the use of the gourd drum. The code is what might be called an African Morse alphabet and is beaten on the drum in the open air.

The sound is carried across the valleys and glens to the next village, where it is interpreted by another scout. If the message is for a distant village he repeats it on his drum, and in this way it is carried from village to village, with very little loss of time until it reaches the person for whom it is intended.

PAINTER IS GAY SUICIDE

Artist Clinked Glasses With Guests, Borrowed Revolver Bullets and Then Shot Himself.

Paris.—After threatening suicide so many times that his friends only took his threats as a joke, Marcelin Ader, a young painter of Bordeaux, has carried out his threat in a highly spectacular manner. It is learned that when he invited his friends to a banquet he warned them that it would be a suicidal affair, and that his friends would witness his self-destruction.

Believing this another of his jests, his circle of friends spent a merry evening. They were horrified when, after dinner, Ader produced a revolver. When he said he had no cartridges, the diners laughed, however, and one of his friends, still thinking that he was joking, furnished the ammunition. The young artist loaded the revolver, clinked glasses with his guests, and putting the weapon to his forehead, killed himself.

DISCOVERS TRAMP IN BED

Wife of Yonkers Architect Temporarily and Then Calls the Police, Who Seize Intruder.

Yonkers, N. Y.—When Mrs. Arthur J. Van Suetendael, wife of a Yonkers architect, went to her bedroom she found sleeping in her bed an unkempt stranger with a week's growth of beard. Her scream as she switched on the electric light awakened him.

Tip-toeing downstairs, she went to the telephone and notified the police. The tramp said he found the front door unlocked, and after warming himself went to bed.

MAY ASK \$143 A DAY ALIMONY

Rich Mrs. Cameron Sues Husband Because He Didn't Get Home Early.

New York.—Whether Mrs. Marguerite Stone Cameron, who lives at the Hotel Savoy, will limit her request for alimony to \$1,600 a week remains to be seen when motions in her suit for separation from her husband, Alpin W. Cameron, are heard in Justice Page's part of the supreme court.

"Mrs. Cameron will not ask for as much as \$3,000 a week," said Mrs. Francis W. Stone of Cleveland, the young woman's mother. "Whether she will limit it to \$1,000 I cannot say."

Mrs. Cameron is as wealthy in her own right as is her husband, who is the son of the millionaire head of the Alpin J. Cameron company, yarn manufacturers, of Philadelphia and Chicago. But the intimation reported to be conveyed in the papers filed by her lawyer, former United States Attorney Gen. John W. Griggs, is that Mrs. Cameron seeks to discipline her husband by drawing heavily upon his pocket book.

No hint of serious disagreement between the Camerons so far attaches to the wife's suit. Mrs. Cameron will allege, so her lawyers admitted, that the cause of estrangement has to do merely with Mr. Cameron's seeming inability to reach home early in the evening.

The Camerons made their home at Ridgewood, N. J., for several years following their marriage at Atlantic on October 7, 1902. Ridgewood, a pretty settlement of the ultra-exclusive type, is accessible only by a railroad. Mr. Cameron was oftentimes kept late by business at the New York offices of his father's concern, 260 Broadway, where he acts as manager.

Recently Mrs. Cameron came to New York to live. She took apartments at the Savoy hotel. This eliminated the railroad as an excuse. But Mrs. Cameron's lawyers allege that, despite this, business still kept Mr. Cameron away until a late hour.

Cameron, who is best known to his friends among the younger habitues of the Waldorf-Astoria, Plaza and other hotels as "Ollie," would not discuss his marital difficulties.

Mrs. Cameron's father is Francis W. Stone, director and official in many railroads. When his daughter was married to Cameron he declared the wedding was brought about "surprisingly." He said his daughter was a minor and that he would "hold parties responsible for the outrage strictly accountable." Matters were later smoothed over.

PENSIONS FOR FRENCH POETS

Fund Will Be Raised by Subscriptions of \$2 a Year—Writers May Retire at Fifty-five.

Paris.—Is the poet's career, so popular if not profitable in France, to become a safe walk in life, assuring its followers of a certain subsistence in their old age?

The Society of French Poets is doing its best to this end, as its official gazette bears witness, for in its last number it may be read that the committee of the society, in conformity with the vote taken at the general meeting of 1910, is about to constitute a mutual aid society with a pension scheme.

It may seem as if the committee had taken a long time before acting on this 1910 resolution, but the precautions with which the French government surrounds any prudential aid society account for the delay. The statutes of the society enact that any French poet who produces a copy of his legal record, wherein any crimes for which he has been prosecuted are noted, and who pays an annual subscription of \$2 will be able to enjoy a pension after he is fifty-five years old.

ARSON IS A BUSINESS THERE

Firebugs Cost New York City \$4,000,000 a Year, According to Commissioner.

New York.—Firebugs are costing New York city \$4,000,000 a year, according to the fire commissioner, Joseph Johnson. The commissioner opened an unusual exhibit to illustrate that arson is a rampant crime in the city, due it is alleged, to the ease with which valueless property can be heavily insured.

Among the exhibits is a series of 135 insurance policies totaling \$127,500 insurance which Commissioner Johnson says agents secured on property valued at only \$3.96. Underwriters answered this sensational showing with the declaration that each new policy rendered all previous ones void, and that \$50 could not have been collected.

The commissioner contends that whether or not that is so, insurance companies are woefully lax in their investigations before issuing policies as compared with the care exercised in Europe. He said one-fourth of all the fires in New York city were due to incendiarism.
