Beef prices were groggy today at prices unevenly lower than prevailed on the closing rounds last week. It was the nearest approach to demoralization the local market has experienced in months.

The market at the primary point today was reported dull and weak at Monday's decline. Private dispatches said a lot of halldover and some fresh stuff could not be worked off.

With all advice from outside markets of a bearish character local buyers were slow to get into action and preliminary bidding indicated a disposition to put prices considerably lower.

Orders were scarce, as eastern cattle are running. Also eastern retailers, expectant of a slump in wholesale prices, are in waiting mood.

The big run today was in calves. It gave distributive trade a blow in the solar plexus. Retailers, close students of market conditions, refused to make inroads into last week's beef accumulation, figuring that continued liquidation of cattle will enable them to buy cheaper.

EITHER FIRE OR QUICKSAND

Kansas Surveying Party Narrowly Escapes Death on Island.

Great Bend, Kan., April 28.—Choosing to chance death by fire rather than by being swallowed up in quicksands, W. A. Rush, county surveyor, and a party of assistants, managed to escape with severe burns about the face and hands on an island in the Arkansas river near here, recently.

The men were surveying the island when fire, which had been smoldering in some debris, broke out afresh. The scrub timber on the island was soon a roaring furnace with a line of flames between them and their boat.

KANSAS CATTLEMEN TO MEET. Friday of this week, May 2, is the day set for the gathering at Manhattan of such Kansas farmers and feeders as are interested in the maintenance of calves through winter in the most economical way, and who are especially interested in silage as a component of the ration in producing beef. There will be a dozen other things of interest for the farmer to learn at Manhattan, and the trip will be worth the price.

The time has arrived when the farmer who doesn't know how to use silage to the best advantage will be sadly handicapped, not only in beef production, but in the economy of the farm. And there isn't any better way to learn than by going to Manhattan and viewing the results of the various experiments. If the individual farmer had to depend on his own efforts to learn what he there will find out in a single day, it would cost him a vast sum of money and years of tiresome toil. The state makes these experiments for him and only asks that he come and see for himself what has been accomplished.

PLOTS USED 23 YEARS. The experimental plots of the Missouri agricultural experiment station are among the oldest in the United States, according to the University of Missouri. They have been in continuous use twenty-three years. The experiment station was established in 1889 and the plots of ground were put in use soon after.

There are thirty-nine plots showing the effect of the rotation of different crops with or without manure. Professor F. M. Miller of the agronomy department, speaking of the experiment, said:

"The records of the experiments on the plots are of great value because they prove the value of the different rotations and fertilizers. One plot has been planted in corn without manuring for twenty-three years. It

yielded 11.8 bushels to the acre this last year. With the rotation of corn and clover a plot in the same year gave a yield of fifty bushels. Corn, oats, wheat and clover produced fifty-four bushels to the acre. Corn, wheat, clover with manure gave seventy-seven bushels to the acre."

GIRLS WILL MAKE BOYS HUSTLE. In the past the boys enrolled in the Missouri Boys' Corn Growing Contest have had a nice, quiet little time dividing up \$1,000 in prizes at the state corn show. But this year they will have the girls to reckon with for the contest has been opened to both boys and girls between the ages of 10 and 20 years. It is just as easy for a girl to get a share of this prize money as it is for the boys. The girls will not be required to do any of the actual work but will be expected to keep all records and pick their samples of corn for the state corn show. Of course there is no objection to girls doing such parts of the work as they can do. There must be at least two girls in every corn growing county of Missouri who are sufficiently interested to get into this contest and make the boys hustle. Besides these prizes the Missouri Women Farmers' Club will give a \$25 cash scholarship in the College of Agriculture to the girl between the ages of 15 and 20 who wins first prize in the contest. ORCHARD GRASS VALUABLE

Crop Grows Well in Shade on Rich, Deep, Sandy Loam.

Orchard grass grows well in the shade, but it makes a larger growth when sown on rich sandy loam, deep and moist. On such soils it starts early in the spring and grows rapidly. This it makes a good grass for a permanent pasture, but when the ground is deep and rich it makes a more valuable hay, as its rapid growth enables one to cut two crops off the same land every year.

Orchard grass should be sown at the rate of two bushels, with 15 pounds of red clover seed per acre. Sow early in April. We like the plan of sowing the orchard grass and clover with oats. The oats are drilled two bushels to the acre, with 490 pounds of a standard bone phosphate to the acre. The orchard grass and clover is sown by hand or with the wheelbarrow just behind the drill, the seed being covered with the brush harrow. When the oats make a growth of two inches the field is rolled. When the oats are in bloom the crop is cut for green feed. Two bushels of land plaster is then sown to the acre and the field rolled to firm soil.

To grow heavy crops the field should be top-dressed with rich, well-rotted manure every second year. Mr. G.

**REST ROOM DRAWING CARD.**  
 Popular With Country Women and Travelers.

Tulsa, Okla., April 29.—The rest room experiment has proved a winner in this city and the women of any town who wish to convince home merchants or city officials can get evidence here that a rest room is a good business investment. The records show that more than 1200 women visited the room in one winter month. There are more when more women come to town.

The support of the room is divided between the city and the women who petitioned the council. The city pays the matron, the women pay the rent, supply the furniture and literature. Since the room has proved its worth it is no trouble to support it.

No one thing has done more to break down the intangible barriers which too often exist between town and country than has this room. It is the first stopping place for mothers who drive in from the country. Their children are left here instead of being dragged around through a winter round of shopping which would reduce them to a state of physical exhaustion and leave their mothers nervous wreck. They can come back for lunch and find this a quiet, restful place for such purposes, or for an hour's rest. The story of the room has spread through a large region and the visitors from the rural districts are increasing in number daily.

The location of the rest room makes it a stopping place for scores of transient visitors and the contrast between this and the usual bare surroundings of a railway station leaves with every visitor a most friendly feeling for the city.

Not only is the room used by non-residents, but it is a veritable Mecca for clerks in the downtown district, who have hitherto had no place where they could rest and eat their noon luncheon. Shoppers from the outskirts of the city are frequent visitors, and the rest room has come to be an indispensable part of the city's life.

**TESTED RECIPES.**  
**Strawberry Sauce.**—One tablespoonful of butter, four tablespoonfuls of sugar, one cup of mashed strawberries. Cream butter and as much of the sugar as it will combine with easily. Mash the berries and add rest of sugar; now beat in the creamed butter, mix well, then put in glass dish and set in cold place. Nice with a steamed pudding.

**Rhubarb Sauce.**—Two pounds of rhubarb, two cups of sugar. Trim off the top and bottom of each stalk, removing only the very coarse part of skin, then cut into small pieces, wash well and put in kettle with just a few spoonfuls of water, just enough so it will not scorch while heating. Cover closely and let simmer until tender, then add the sugar and let simmer ten more minutes. If a little cornstarch is added it will be a good filling for tarts.

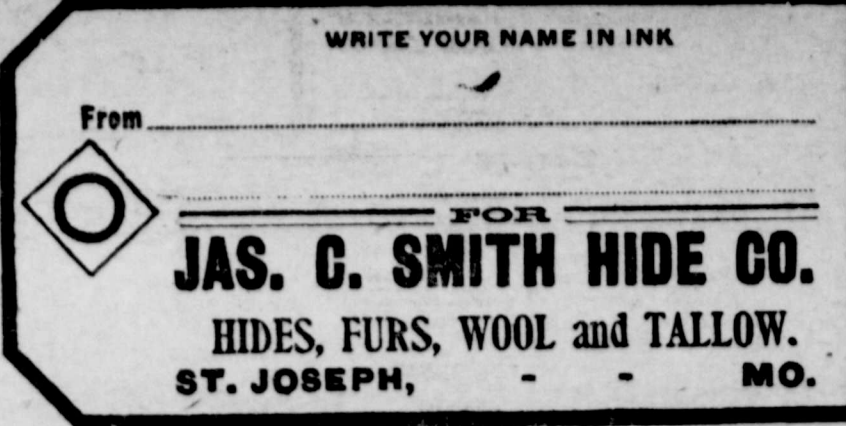
**Fruit Surprise.**—One-half of a banana, one tablespoonful of orange or lemon juice, one tablespoonful each of pineapple and strawberries, sugar as needed, whipped cream to cover. Place the banana flat side up on a plate, pour the juice over, grind the pineapple and crush the strawberries and mix with sugar to taste. Spread this on the banana and run a little whipped cream along top. This is a nice company dessert and by mixing the fruit and setting aside in advance it can be prepared on short notice. The pineapple and berries are measured after they are crushed and sugared.

**Banana Salad.**—Lay a half of a banana on a crisp lettuce leaf, pour a little lemon juice over. Then slice some firm strawberries on that. Lay long thin strips of pineapple over, dust lightly with powdered sugar and place a tablespoonful of boiled salad dressing and whipped cream, equal parts and beaten together, on top.

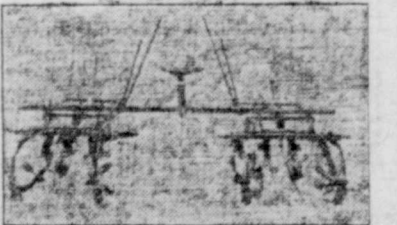
