PRICES AS GENERAL RULE HOLD LAST WEER'S CLOSING LEV-EL-EXCEPTIONS WEAK.

Butcher Stock Mainly Steady; Spots Strong-Bulls and Veal Calves Unchanged - Stock Cattle Fully Steady.

General conditions surrounding the fat cattle trade for the opening day fat cattle trade for the opening day of the week were not overly encouraging to the selling and producing side, although the local market presented no bad features, last week's final session. A fairly good clearance was effected by traders during closing days last week and today sented no bad features, last week's final session. 


