Beef steer trade displayed good form today under the influence of rather light receipts and a broader demand. Cattle took on a big fill but this did not tend to restrain early activity. The run of cattle here today was estimated at 1,300 head, compared with arrivals of 1,714 last Tuesday and 1,653 a year ago. The five leading markets reported a total of 18,600 head in sight against 20,800 a week ago and 16,800 a year ago.

BUYERS SUCCEED IN SHADING PRICES AFTER LONG DRAWN OUT SESSION.

It was a long drawn out session in the hog division today. Receipts fig-ured around 5,200 head here and the the hog division today. Receipts figured around 5,200 head here and the five markets had, all told, approximately 58,000 as compared with 5,498 at this point and 50,300 at the five markets last Tuesday. Buyers started out bidding lower, while salesmen held out stubbornly for steady prices. This diversity of views resulted in a limited volume of actual trading during the early hours of the session. Less than a fifth of the offerings had changed hands up to 10:30 o'clock and it was well along in the afternoon before the final clearance was effected. The earlier sales were quoted barely steady to 2½c lower than yesterday. Subsequent transactions were rated generally weak to a shade lower compared with the average of the session.



HAVE LIFE ONLY IN FABLES

Well-Known but Never Seen Animale -Among Them the Phoenix Dragon and Unicorn.

There are some mythological monsters which all of us have heard of, but none of us have ever seen. Who, for nstance, has ever set eyes on a Phoenix, that remarkable bird, men-tioned even by church writers, which renews its youth in the fire? And yet there are few birds whose names are more widely known.

In spite of fairy tales and Chinese armorial bearings where is the museum that contains even a bone, let alone a skeleton of a dragon? As a matter of fact, did snakes ever fly?

Equally fanciful is the unicorn. More ought to be known about this good and gentle animal. In particular he is susceptible to female charms, a fact that was taken advantage of by hunters, who, according to the story books, used a beautiful maiden as a decoy to enable them to capture the unicorn. The chief prize about the unicorn was not the brush, as in the case of the fox, but the horn. This was considered the finest antidote to poison, and so strong was this belief that almost up to the time of the French Revolution all food served at the royal table in France was touched with a piece of what was supposed to be the horn of a unicorn. Even in China legends about the unicorn prevail. There it is described as so gentle that it would not walk on growing grass or tread on the smallest insect. Unicorn, it may be added, were the supporters of the arms of the old kings of Scotland, and for that reason the unicorn is represented today in the British armorial bearings.

NEUTRAL WATER IN RIVERS

Where Fresh and Salt Come Together and for a Short Space the Two Elements Refuse to Mingle. .

According to old fishermen there is what might be called neutral ground, or rather neutral water, in rivers where there is no use of trying to make a catch-unless it be that some fool fish with a piscatorial brainstorm snatches bait like an insane human might grab a red-hot stove.

This neutral water is the part of the river where its flow encounters .he saine impregnation of the salt water of the bay or ocean ebb and the flow of the tide the salt water of the bay runs up into the river for miles, and on the reverse the fresh water descends several miles again to the bay leading into the salt sea.

There is a midway between the salt and fresh water points, however, that very seldom shifts. Around this midway shad and blue and other salt-water fish, if they visit at all, will hover on the ocean side. On the fresh-water fringe will loiter such fish as inhabit currents that are devoid of the saline ingredient. If the fisherman happens to cast bait in this neutral zone he is not likely to get either one kind or the other.

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
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
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
