He said that the objectives of the 1963 program are: To Stabilize farm income and hold down buildup of stocks; to protect the producer-feeder; to cut program (USDA) program costs, and to protect the consum-

He explained that past grain sorghum programs had upped the farmers' income by some \$2 billion. As a result of the program in the past, government stocks of grain sorghum had been reduced 27 million tons.

In explaining the USDA program history of the system was traced showing that from 1952 to 1960, grain sorghum had been increased by some 7 million tons a year. Then in 1961 the use, for the first time in years, exceeded output, so stocks of grain sorghum declined. In 1962 this trend contin-


