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
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"DO IT YOURSELF KITS"

"For the sons of the world are wiser in their own generation than the sons of life."

The tragedy of the day, our own day, any day, is the sad truth that the concern and zeal of man is so largely spent in the world and spiritual growth must depend upon what is left of time, strength, mind, and money. We are told over and over again that we are made in the likeness of God, that we cannot be our own saviors, that we cannot have the good life save as we let God come into our lives. But yet we go on and on, depending upon our own abilities, using our time and talents for our own self-determined purposes.

We today are first sons of this world and then children of the light. Our week day work is so important that only an emergency can take us away but there are hundreds of things to keep us away from church on Sunday. Our children's absence from secular school have to be accounted for but absence from church school is dismissed without a thought. A golfer who bungles a shot in a tournament will go out and practice the shot for hours, but when a mistake is made in moral conduct the matter is treated at best with a swift prayer before jumping in bed. A housewife makes the wrong play in a bridge game and goes berserk, while her children roam the streets without parental guidance.

God can save to the uttermost and He has given himself fully to help us. But God forces himself on no one. We do not automatically grow in the good life. Even God does not feed us with the good things of life unless we go to him with hungry appetites and open mouths. Spiritual saints are not turned out in vending machines, and we will not be a better world in which to live until we give adequate attention to the things which make possible a better world. We cannot live by bread alone, we do not live by bread alone.
