# Chamberlain Remains by **Close Vote**

### 134 Members of the Commons Refused to **Vote in Ouster Suit**

LONDON, May 9 (AP)-The house of commons recessed today until May 21, leaving the Chamberlain government apparently determined to remain in office on the strength of yetserday's slim margin of a vote of confidence.

Meanwhile, Britain's war effort was accelerated by a royal degree making 2,500,000 more men available for military service.

Chamberlain and members of the war cabinet and opposition leaders reported in secret consultations the government was also prepared to deal sternly with spying, sabotage and "fifth column" activities, the death penalty for grave cases being included in a bill prepared for presentation to parliament.

LONDON, May 9 (AP)-Neville Chamberlain remained the master of Britain's war government by the narrow margin of 81 votes last night after beating off for the moment the thunder of criticism which half All Business in two days of historic house of comin two days of historic house of commons debate had threatened his ministry for its surrender in Cen-

tral and Southern Norway. The government carried a vote on a question of confidence at conmiralty Winston Churchill's calm, firm, almost deprecatory speech, by 281 Tory votes to 200 for the combined opposition.

The conservatives' position was clouded, however, by the 134 absentees or abstensions, who, with those voting in opposition, make a maj-

ority of the 615 members. Moreover, an estimated forty members who normally are government supporters voted with the op-

Some political observers speculatprime minister, chastened by the School Shooting unexpectedly large opposition vote might follow the example of the former premier of France, Edouard Daladier, and resign. There was nothing, however, to confirm any

such intention. Men who had hammered at the government for two days took the vote as a victory rather than as a defeat. Jubilantly they sang, Rule Brittania, and shouted "Go, Rethe gaunt Chamberlain

Should the man who led Britain troy "Hitlerism," actually go to the king to resign, his most likely successor would be Churchill or Foreign Secretary Lord Halifax, possibly at the head of the government of

But the political situation was in

a great state of uncertainty. One possibility, however, was that Chamberlain would now attempt to form a national government of all parties, inviting labor and liberals to take portfolios in his cabinet. The labor party convention on

Monday may decide to reverse its decision not to participate in the government.



# Survey Shows Heavy Drinking Between 20-30

CHICAGO (U.P.)-Excessive drinking, especially among persons between 20 and 30 years old, has increased greatly in the last three years, according to Charles R. Jones, executive vice president of the American Business Men's Research Foundation.

"A survey reveals that in younger age group two out of five men and one out of twelve women drink in such amounts as to constitute in many cases sub-standard risks for life insurance companies,"

Jones said the foundation was conducting an analysis of the experiences of insurance companies as concerns drinking habits.

"Drinking habits, we have found, are responsible for one of the most difficult situations ever to rise in the life insurance business," he "Many directors and underwrit-

ers are advising us that they are forced either to decline outright or to accept only at special rates, more applicants for life insurance for execssive drinking habits than for any other cause," Jones said.
"With high blood pressure and

serious heart ailments, both frequently the result of drinking, they are are reponsible for more rejections than for all other causes combined," Jones said.

# HOW to EAT to BEAT the HEAT

# Here Are the 10 Commandments

WARM weather's back and with it the question of what to eat. Thanks to the modern dietitians your menu is pretty well planned for you, based on the so-called

1. Thou shalt

have the equivalent of at least one pint of milk (adults), one qt. Alice H. Smith (children). 2. Thou shalt have a serving of

green leafy or yellow vegetable daily. 3. Thou shalt have a serving of citrus fruit or tomato daily. 4. Thou shalt have a serving of raw fruit or vegetable daily.
5. Thou shalt have a serving of other fruit or vegetable daily.

6. Thou shalt have an egg daily when possible, otherwise three or four times weekly.
7. Thou shalt have at least one serving of whole grain cereal or bread daily.

8. Thou shalt have one serving of meat, fish, poultry, or meat sub-stitute (legumes) several times weekly.

9. Thou shalt have enough fats and sweets to meet daily the individual requirements. 10. Thou shalt have at least five or six glasses of fluid daily (wa-

ter, tea, coffee, broth). It is not necessary that the milk be used as a beverage. It may be used in soups, sauces, gravies, puddings, ice cream or served as cheese. One ounce of chedder cheese is approximately equal in food value to five ounces of milk. When churned buttermilk or skimmed milk is used it may be necessary to include extra vitamin A in the form of green and yellow vegetables, liver, egg yolk or fish liver oil. Evaporated milk may be used for drinking and cooking since it has the same food

value as whole fresh fluid milk. Vegetables should be prepared carefully to prevent loss of the many valuable food constituents which are soluble. Avoid soaking vegetables in water, cooking in large quantities, and overcooking.


