

Great Battle Said Forming Along Muese

Allied Retreats Are Admitted in Belgium As New Lines Set

PARIS, May 14. (AP) - The high command acknowledged today Germans, gaining momentum in a sweep through southeastern Belgium, had crossed France's northern border and "the greatest battle of all times in all countries" was developing along the Muese river.

Thousands of allied tanks, armored cars and airplanes engaged the German attackers from Liege, Belgium, to Sedan

French dispatches estimated the Germans were using between 6,000 and 7,000 planes on the Belgian

front. Germany dealt two smashing blows of war in Western Europe. The French conceded "probably the fall" of E n, 10 miles inside the French border in the fortified Franco-Belgian defense zone, directly be force France's "little Maginot" extending to the North sea.


