Golf Members Attend Church

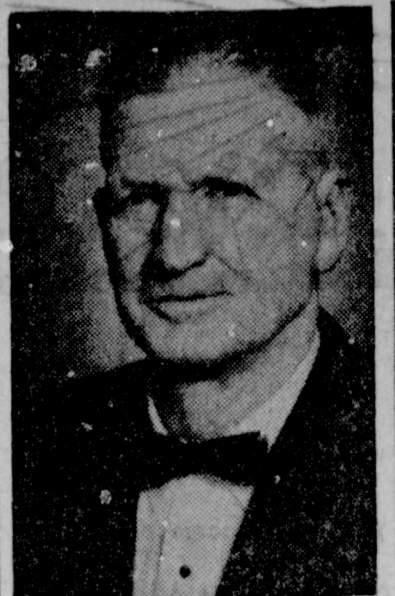
Members of the Muleshoe Women's Golf Association attended church services and lunch as a group at the First Methodist Church Tuesday, in observance of Holy Week.

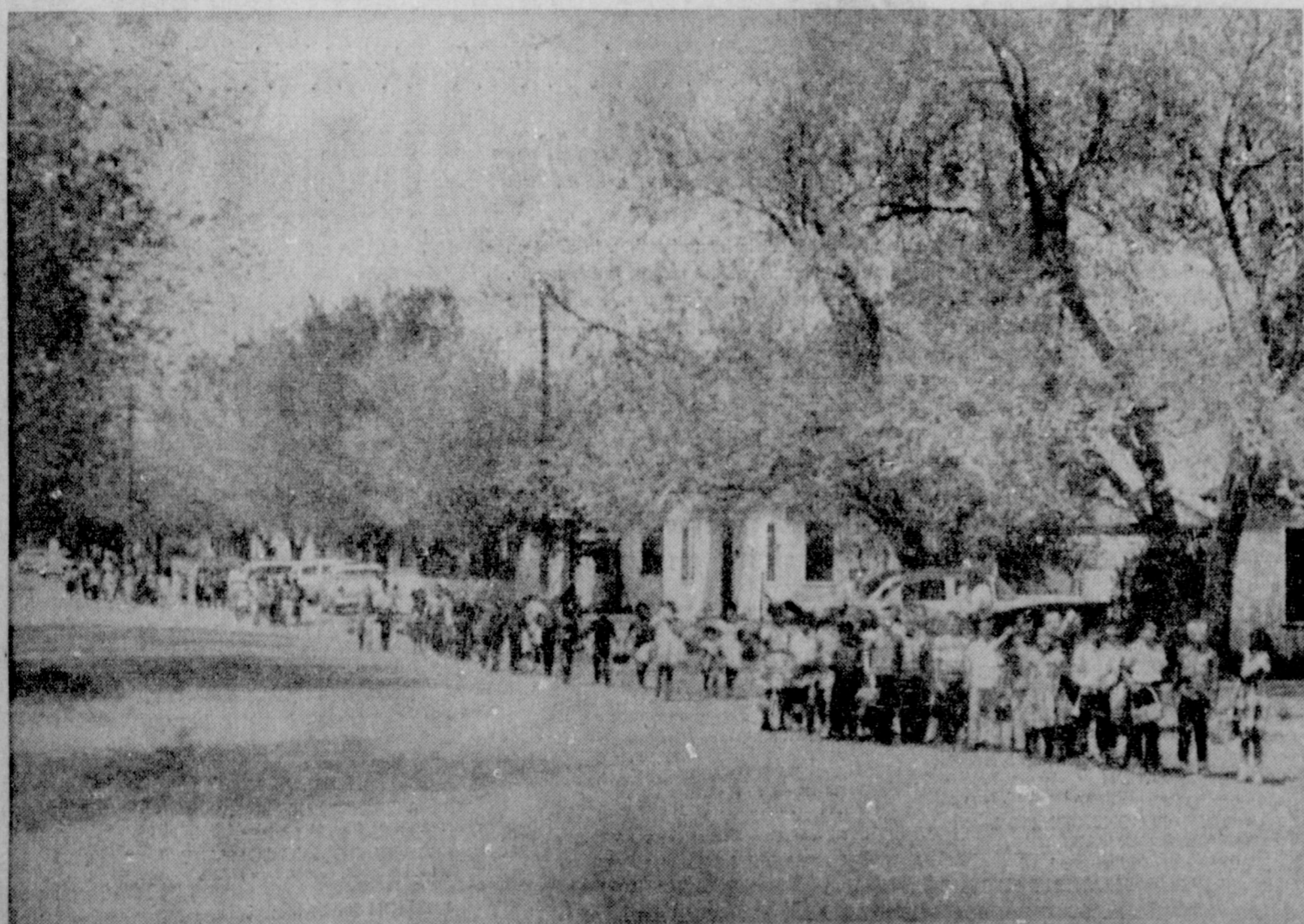
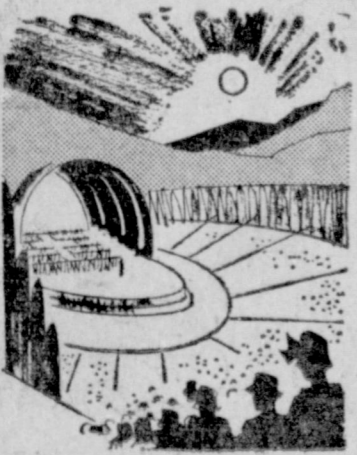

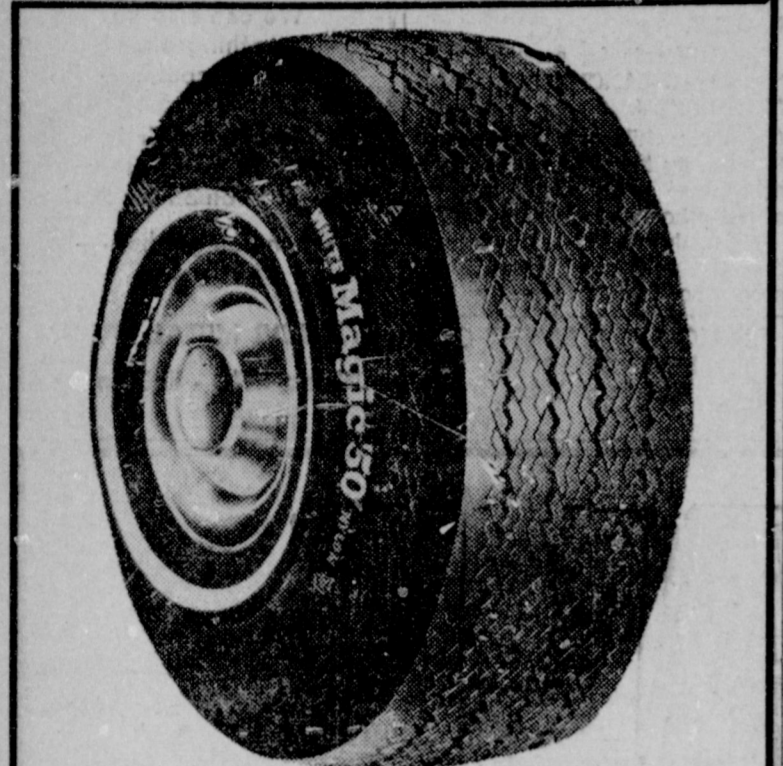
